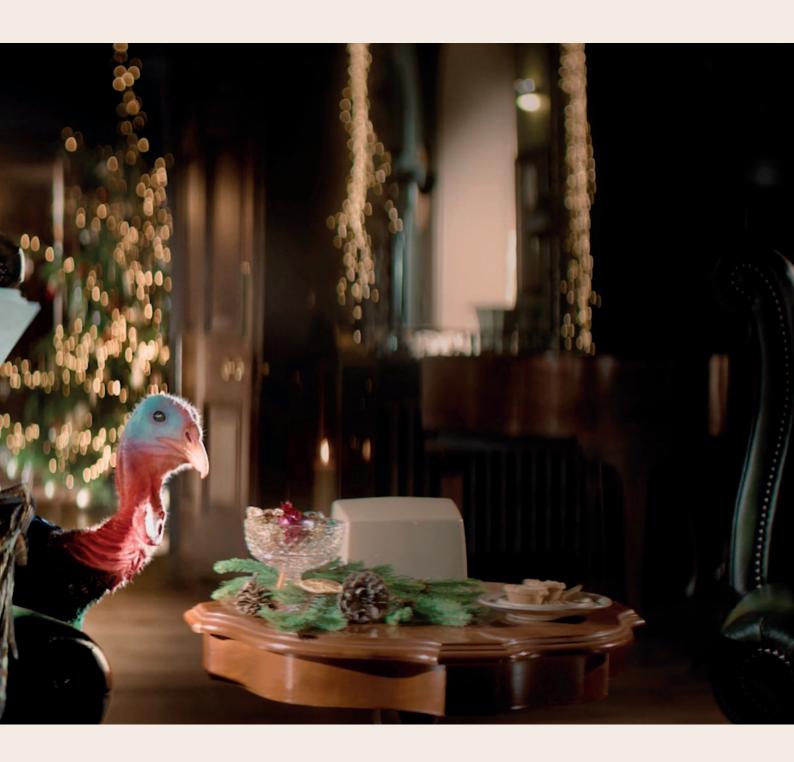

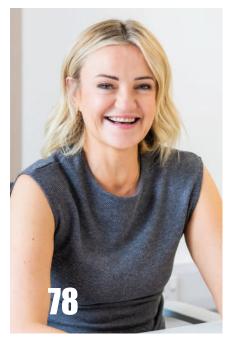

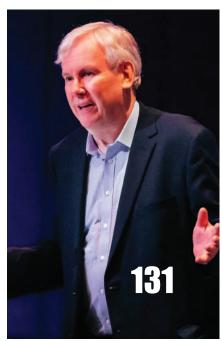

Kip McGrath expands in the North East

An experienced teacher who has already helped almost 3,000 children across Gateshead and Chester-Le-Street is expanding her successful Kip McGrath Education Centres into Washington, Tyne and Wear.

Carol Milne, a former science teacher and head of year, left the classroom in 2015 to set up her first Kip McGrath Education Centre in Gateshead East. Since opening the doors in March 2016, she has gone on to launch a second centre in Chester-Le-Street in 2021 and now, five years later, is opening her third in Washington. The new hub will be based at Washington Library, making high-quality tuition even more accessible for local families.

Carol discovered Kip McGrath in 2015, having taken voluntary redundancy from St Joseph's College in South Tyneside. Using her redundancy money, she invested in the franchise and has since built a thriving business employing 30 staff. What started as Carol teaching and managing everything alone has grown into a strong organisation with fully qualified teachers and support staff across three sites.

All tuition is delivered by fully qualified, DBS-checked teachers, using a traditional curriculum approach tailored to each child's ability level. The focus is not only on closing knowledge gaps, but also on building confidence, independence and resilience.

Successful fifth year for North East business week

North East business leaders have hailed the success of a popular business event, with over 1,000 people attending sessions across Sunderland.

Sunderland man wins Higher Apprentice of the Year

John Elliott - an Access Training apprentice and engineer at Pyrocel - impressed the judges by doubling the capacity of his employer's installations department, increasing revenue by 30%, and excelling in a management position usually held by someone double his age.

After completing A Levels at St Robert of Newminster Sixth Form in Washington, John came to Gateshead-based Access Training as a shy, underconfident 18-year-old with a natural ability in maths and engineering, and a desire to earn while he learned

He embarked on a Level 3 Apprentice Fire Alarm Installer course and was placed with Newcastle-based fire and security provider, Pyrocel. He was the first in his class to complete the apprenticeship in just 2.5 years and then enrolled on a Level 4 Project Management Apprenticeship with Access Training where he said he "discovered a passion for organisation and problem-solving."

John has seen rapid career progression including two promotions and a 60% pay increase since starting with Pyrocel where he is now a project engineer overseeing a team of installers and £2.4m worth of projects annually.

John said of his award win: "I am feeling very proud. When I began my apprenticeship, I was reserved and lacked confidence but with the support from Access Training and my employer, my apprenticeship has changed my life and I'm passionate about showing others where apprenticeships can lead.

"My long-term ambition is to progress into senior leadership and contribute to my company's continued growth."

John will now go on to the national final of the National Apprenticeship Awards in London on November 26 at The Royal Lancaster hotel.

STANDING UP FOR CONNECTION IN A DISCONNECTED WORLD

How Bonded Agency's Social Purpose Strategy Is Driving Real Human Connection Where It's Needed Most

In today's world, "connection" often brings to mind Wi-Fi bars or how many people follow us online. The deeper kind of connection, the sort that builds trust and helps people understand one another, can seem tougher to find than ever. At Bonded Agency, connection is more than a buzzword. It's a guiding principle for how we work, how we support our people, and how we contribute to our region. Now, we're finding ways to make sure our values reach beyond the boardroom and into the communities

Why Social Purpose Matters Now

around us

Connection runs through everything we do at Bonded, from how our clients and their audiences engage, to how we build our own teams. But when we started developing our social purpose strategy, we knew we wanted to do more than just pick a charity from the top down. We wanted our social impact work to reflect the real concerns of our staff, not just our leadership team.

Working closely with Hannah Underwood, a respected social impact advisor, we opened the conversation across the entire agency. Through research, debate, and honest discussion, we explored which issues truly resonated with our people and our brand values. After plenty of dialogue, one theme emerged clearly: loneliness, especially among young people.

The data made the urgency clear. According to the British Association for Counselling and Psychotherapy, a striking 72% of people aged 16–25 report that loneliness harms their mental health. Here's a generation that has grown up surrounded by digital platforms, yet so many are missing out on meaningful social bonds. For us at Bonded, this felt like exactly the right place to focus our efforts. After all, genuine human contact isn't just important - it is the most effective answer to disconnection.

From Insight To Action

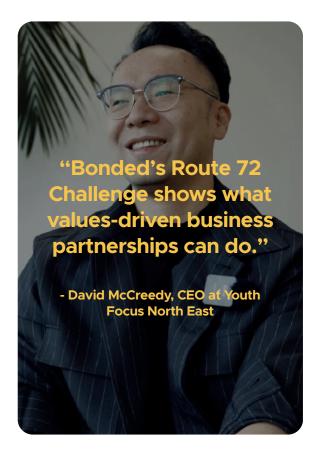
We selected Youth Focus North East as our charity partner because they're the main organisation supporting young people experiencing loneliness across our region. Over a three-year period through their Belong Collective initiative, they've reached 7,918 young people through targeted resources in hotspot areas, creating vital opportunities for connection, learning, and growth. Through high-quality youth work, they provide safe spaces where young people can be heard, build relationships, develop new skills, and strengthen their support networks. By joining forces with them, we can make a real difference together.

To kickstart our support, we launched the Route 72 Challenge in September, setting ourselves a £1,000 fundraising target. The challenge saw our team collectively cover 170 miles during the month, matching the length of the UK's Route 72 cycle path. Team members aimed for just over 10,000 steps per day (equivalent to about 5 miles), with everyone contributing to a shared fundraising platform rather than individual sponsorship drives.

The challenge culminated with our participation in the Dragon Boat Race on September 26th, bringing together our fundraising efforts and team spirit on the River Tyne. This creative effort raised both funds and awareness for Youth Focus North East and marked the beginning of a lasting partnership. As Youth Focus North East emphasises, tackling youth loneliness requires genuine collaboration and meaningful relationships - partnerships that go beyond fundraising to build connections, share expertise, and unite people around a shared purpose. Bonded is committed to bringing our skills, networks, and knowledge into play - not just our donations.







Business Benefits Of Social Purpose

Social purpose isn't only about doing the right thing for others. It has helped us build a stronger culture at Bonded Agency. Team engagement has risen, we've uncovered fresh ideas, and the work we do together now feels more significant. We keep track of these changes, using both data and honest feedback from our people.

We have seen that when businesses nurture real connection, everyone wins. That means happier employees, more creative campaigns, and deeper relationships with our clients. For instance, our staff turnover is just 5% over more than three years, much lower than industry averages. Putting people first is always good for business.

We're not claiming to have all the answers, but we do know it's possible for businesses to make a real difference, even if it's just in their own communities. How Lumo tore up the rulebook on rail and built something entirely new

Starting with no HR department, no legacy systems and no inherited baggage, Lumo has built a people-first culture from the ground up. People and Culture Manager Lindsay Gauntlett explains how a clean slate became the company's greatest strength...

When Lindsay Gauntlett joined Lumo in January 2021, she was one of just a handful of employees. There was no HR department, no ready-made playbook, and certainly no inherited way of doing things. And it turned out to be the company's superpower in building the company's famed inclusive culture.

"We were literally building everything from scratch in real time," she recalls. "And it's the best thing that could have happened because it came with no baggage. We were all in it together. We just wanted to be open and inclusive. Everybody felt heard, everybody felt valued and what we built has persevered."

It was a far cry from her previous role in private healthcare, which she'd taken after being made redundant when her children were small. "I wasn't even looking to move," she admits. "I scrolled past the job a few times, but something about it stuck with me. It was the chance to build something new. And we did."

Importing fresh DNA

In a sector where tradition and hierarchy run deep, Lumo deliberately set out to be different. During Covid, when hospitality and airlines were hit hard, Gauntlett turned to those industries for talent. What could have been an accident of circumstance became a strategic advantage, allowing Lumo to tap into a workforce where customer-centric service comes naturally and diversity is the norm. The result has been a culture - and a customer experience - that has helped give Lumo a clear USP in a sector often weighed down by its own ways of doing things.

"That really shaped what the customer experience looks like on board," she explains. "And it's probably helped shape the diversity within Lumo too."

For someone who describes herself as "down-to-earth and family orientated," that people-first instinct comes naturally. And it fits right in Lumo, which as been dubbed by Modern Railways as one 'big blue family'.

"I've been with my husband for 25 years, I've got two kids, a dog, and my idea of heaven is walking in the countryside or, one day, retiring to a villa in Greece with goats," she laughs. "So building something where people feel supported and happy felt obvious to me."

Today, passengers notice the difference in the way colleagues interact with them on Lumo's services up and down the East Coast Mainline - and soon to be on the West Coast Mainline. But internally, it has also set the tone for how people work together. New recruits go through a "culture interview" with Gauntlett and the Service Delivery Director before they even start. It's a two-way conversation about values, expectations, and whether the fast-paced environment is right for them, Lindsay explains.

"It's about making sure people know what they're coming into," she says. "And it's helped keep our turnover low, because everyone's clear on what Lumo is about from day one."

And it's not just the colleagues that benefit. Passengers are responding too - the company landed a 96% overall satisfaction rating last year in the Customer Insight Survey, commissioned by the open access operator, and led by The TAS Partnership transport consultancy working with market research specialists MRFGR.

Lumo's culture mission has also seen it awarded the Clear Assured Bronze Standard, a globally-recognised standard that's awarded to businesses which can demonstrate their commitment to inclusivity and diversity. As of last year, 95% of Lumo's operational workforce has come through the Newcastle-based business's apprentice programme in partnership with Train'd Up. And in the past three years, 29 females have completed the training compared to 27 males breaking all sorts of industry cliches.

Flat, open, and all-in together

But for Gauntlett, Lumo's culture isn't about an award in a cabinet - it's the lived day to day and in every policy she and her small team put together. Lumo's head offices in Newcastle were designed to bring train crew and office colleagues together, avoiding the silos common across the industry where train crew and back office functions can be separated by miles. The management team is deliberately lean, and access to senior leaders is direct.

"There's no hierarchy here," she says. "If someone's got an issue, they'll just pop in to see the Service Delivery Director or Managing Director. People aren't scared to do that."

That openness extends to mucking in when needed. Every contract includes the expectation that colleagues can act as ambassadors in times of disruption, whatever their day job. Gauntlett herself has found that spirit in action more than once





- including an Easter when she was spotted trundling boxes of mini eggs through Newcastle station for customers.

"You find yourself in bizarre situations," she laughs. "But nobody says 'that's not my job.' We just get on and do it. Everyone has each other's backs and that pays it all forward."

Work-life balance has become one of the pillars of Lumo's culture too. Annual leave must be taken in-year - there's no option to roll it over - to make sure people properly switch off. Flexibility is agreed case by case, rather than being bound by rigid policy.

"If you're happy at home, you're happy at work. They affect each other, don't they?" says Gauntlett. "We don't have hard and fast rules. People manage their own workloads, and we support them when they need it."

She admits she keeps a watchful eye on colleagues' wellbeing. "If I see someone online late at night, the first thing I'll do is message them: why are you working at this hour? That kind of check-in makes a difference."

Perhaps the most striking part of Gauntlett's philosophy is her determination to prove HR can be more than a corporate shield. "I think people might be surprised by how much I care," she says. "People think HR is just there to protect the business. Of course we do protect the business, but the way I see it, we do that by doing the right thing by people."

It's a conviction shaped by hard lessons. Early in her career, she was pressured by a manager to dismiss someone against her

better judgement. "I did it, but it still affects me to this day," she says. "It taught me never to be put in that position again - and now I'll always challenge something if it doesn't feel right."

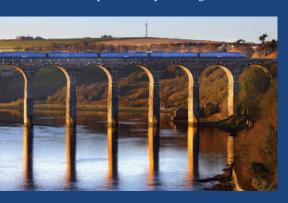
Five years on from launch, Lumo has grown from 20 people to more than 115 on the East Coast, with a new team building up on the West Coast Mainline as Lumo's parent company FirstGroup launches services from Glasgow to London next year. For Gauntlett, the culture that has emerged is the company's most valuable asset — and one that sets it apart from the rest of the industry.

"I've never worked anywhere as supportive as Lumo," she says. "If I'm struggling, there's always someone ready to help. And it's not just me who feels that way — people are protective of this place, because they've helped build it."

It's that sense of ownership, she says, that makes the hard graft worthwhile. "It was tough in the beginning — really tough. I questioned what I was doing more than once. But when you see people proud of being part of Lumo, that's when you know it was worth it."

In an industry often criticised for being slow to adapt, Lumo has shown what's possible when a new operator starts with a blank page and puts people at the centre. As Gauntlett puts it simply: "It always comes back to one question: what's the right thing to do by people?"

Directors urged to act now ahead of new company ID rules

In recent years, there has been a clear shift towards greater transparency around who owns and controls UK businesses, as regulators work to reduce the risk of fraud and misuse.

That focus will intensify this November, when new identity verification rules come into force, placing fresh responsibilities on company directors.

The Economic Crime and Corporate Transparency Act (ECCTA) is new legislation introduced by the government to improve corporate transparency and reduce fraud within UK businesses. It requires company directors to take proactive steps to ensure ongoing compliance.

At present, businesses are required to submit an annual return to Companies House, providing key information about their structure and ownership.

However, from 18 November 2025, all company directors, persons with significant control (PSCs), and anyone involved in setting up, running, owning, or controlling a company will be required to verify their identity with Companies House each year.

They will also need to confirm that their purpose is lawful both upon incorporation and within their annual confirmation statement.

The Registrar of Companies will have enhanced powers to query these statements and remove any false or inaccurate information from the register.

A new system of financial penalties for non-compliance with identity verification and filing requirements will also be introduced as part of the legislation. Fines will be tiered based on the severity of the offence or the company's previous reporting record.

Penalties will start at £250 for minor offences and £500 for serious offences, rising to £1,500 or £2,000 for repeat offenders.

Laura Weir, associate director at RMT Accountants & Business Advisors, says: "The ECCTA is designed to reform the role of Companies House and strengthen transparency across UK businesses, giving it a greater part to play in both tackling economic crime and supporting growth.

"From a day-to-day business administration perspective, these changes mean all businesses must take proactive steps to ensure they remain compliant, with the new penalties providing a clear incentive to do so.

"We're encouraging our clients to get ahead of the new requirements now, before they become mandatory, to avoid last-minute pressure and potential delays in updating company records."

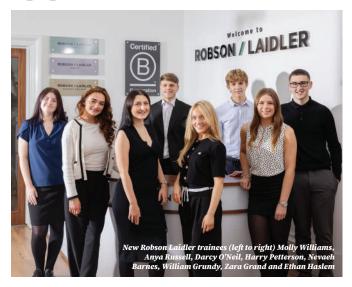

Supporting Tier One in managing Develop North in its next phase of growth is a highly experienced, locally embedded asset management team, including residential acquisitions and leasing specialists Homes or Houses, and commercial property investment experts Broadoak Asset Management.

The enlarged asset management team will bring deep regional insight and sector expertise, enabling Develop North to identify and execute high-quality investments that align with market opportunities and community needs.

John Newlands, Chairman of Develop North, said: "The North East is on the cusp of transformational growth, and the private sector has a vital role to play in supporting that momentum.

"With devolution and investment frameworks now in place, the North East and Tees Valley Combined Authorities are making the region more investable than ever. As a trusted investment partner, Develop North is well-placed to ensure that the investment opportunity of the North East is open to everyone."

expectation that institutional investors,
including Local Government Pension

1,100 new jobs as Merchant Park Development reaches major milestone



Over 1,100 new jobs are being created in Newton Aycliffe as Merchant Park announces the completion of its first 53,993 sq. ft warehouse development.

This significant boost for the region was welcomed by North East Mayor Kim McGuinness who toured the site on Millennium Way and met with the development team to discuss the opportunities this brings for local people and businesses.

Kim McGuinness, North East Mayor said: "Small and medium-sized businesses are the beating heart of our economy. As Mayor, I'm determined to help them grow, create thousands of new jobs, and deliver real opportunities for people across our region.

"Developments like Merchant Park show what's possible when we invest in our local business community and back their ambition. This new site is already bringing high-quality jobs to the area, with even more to come as the project expands."

Mayor Kim was also pleased to see energy-efficient technology, such as heat pumps, roof mounted PV and EV charging supporting the region's net zero ambitions.

Merchant Park is a 65-acre development at Aycliffe Business Park, home to the 30-acre Hitachi Rail Europe train manufacturing facility, one of the largest inward investment manufacturing developments in recent years. The new warehouse is the first of three units, with infrastructure work underway for further premises of 89,000 sq. ft and 126,000 sq. ft, ensuring continued job creation and economic growth.

A seven-figure senior debt package from FW Capital, backed by the North East Combined Authority (North East CA), has supported the project's delivery. The North East CA has also provided incentives to bridge the financial viability gap for the first phase, including infrastructure for the next two units.

The Mayor's visit was an opportunity to meet the development team, including Adrian Goodall, Michael Chicken and Geoff Hunton, as well as contractors Hall Construction and Helm Consulting, whose local workforce completed the project ahead of schedule. Property enquiries are being handled by CBRE and Connect Property North East.

Adrian Goodall, Director at Merchant Park Developments, said: "Everything ground to a halt post Covid, and we needed a funding boost to assist the completion of this project. The backing of FW Capital and the North East CA has enabled us to fast-track delivery of the first unit. Thanks also go to the work of everyone on site, especially the team at Hall Construction whose

commitment to the job has allowed the project to be completed ahead of schedule. Welcoming Kim to look around the site and talk to the people involved has been great and we thank her for her time."

Chris Dixon, Fund Manager at FW Capital, added: "Watching developments come to fruition is a very satisfying part of the job. The team at Merchant Park Developments has impressed us with their vision and focus to bring Unit 1 to completion. With excellent road links and quality commercial warehouse and office space, it's a great location for any business looking to be based out of the North East."

Geoff Hunton Merchant Park Developments said: "The completion of Unit 1 at Merchant Park comes at opportune time because it's the 10th anniversary of Hitachi's rail's factory opening which was completed by Merchant Anglo Property Holdings. This all coincides with national celebrations marking 200 years since the birth of the modern railway."

The North East Commercial Property Investment Fund is a £35 million fund supporting new and refurbished commercial projects, aiming to create 5,600 jobs and develop 140,000 sq. m of commercial space across the region.

Accountant of the month

This month Northern Insight spoke to...

Steven Tuckwell

Owner, 1st Cloud Accountants.

What inspired you to become an Accountant, and what path did you take to get here?

From being a paperboy, to working fruit markets on cold mornings to selling Christmas Trees whilst still at school, the work ethic has always been in me. This led me to be fascinated by how businesses work with the stories behind them and how to make money. Bridging the Al Skills Gan

How SMEs can avoid **Implementation Failures** in Finance.

Artificial Intelligence (AI) has rapidly shifted from futuristic concept to practical tool, and it's no longer just the domain of large corporates. Small and medium-sized enterprises (SMEs) are increasingly exploring how AI could transform their finance function. From automating reporting and improving forecasting accuracy to enhancing strategic decision-making, AI offers the potential to make finance teams leaner, more accurate, and more forwardlooking.

But too often, AI projects fail to deliver the benefits promised. Research shows the problem isn't the technology itself, but the lack of skills and expertise needed to make it work in practice. For SMEs - where resources and budgets are limited - this skills gap can be particularly acute.

Understanding the AI Skills Gap

The skills gap refers to the mismatch between the expertise needed to implement AI and the capability available within a business. In finance, this often means:

- Weaknesses in data management, reconciliation, and system integration.
- Limited experience handling large datasets.
- A lack of knowledge about AI tools and their practical application.

Finance teams are highly skilled in their professional domain, but if AI is deployed without clear objectives or the right foundations, the outcome can be technology that looks impressive but adds little real value, or worse, projects that stall completely.

Why SMEs struggle more than large

Large organisations typically have in-house IT and data specialists who can lead AI initiatives. SMEs rarely have that luxury. Finance directors and owners are expected to keep pace with new technology while also managing everyday responsibilities.

Scale also presents challenges. Smaller businesses may not generate the same volume of financial data as corporates, which can limit how effectively AI tools are trained. Off-the-shelf solutions exist, but they still require careful integration.



Without expertise, SMEs risk either overinvesting in tools they cannot use, or underinvesting and missing opportunities.

Practical steps to bridge the gap

SME finance teams MUST approach AI implementation as a structured process rather than a one-off project.

1. Start with clear objectives.

AI should solve real finance problems, not be introduced for its own sake. Pinpoint areas where it can add measurable value.

2. Begin with pilot projects.

A small-scale pilot helps test technology, refine workflows, and build team confidence without the risks of full-scale transformation.

3. Upskill finance teams.

Finance professionals don't need to become data scientists, but upskilling in data analysis and AI basics is essential.

4. Bring in external support.

Outsourced finance directors or specialist advisors can guide tool selection, oversee integration, and ensure projects deliver measurable results.

5. Strengthen data governance.

AI is only as good as the data it analyses. If data capture and reconciliations are weak, AI outputs will be unreliable. SMEs should review finance processes to ensure clean, consistent data and factor in compliance and ethical considerations from the outset.

The human element

A common misconception is that AI replaces finance professionals. In reality, AI is most powerful when it supports, not substitutes, human judgment.

AI can process large volumes of data and spot patterns that would otherwise remain hidden. But it is finance leaders and their teams who interpret those insights, challenge assumptions, and translate them into actions that support growth.

By automating repetitive tasks, AI helps free a business to focus on higher-value work: advising management, shaping strategic plans, and improving decisionmaking. The real value lies not in the algorithms themselves but in how people use them.

The road ahead

For SMEs, adopting AI in finance, or other parts of the business, is no longer a question of if but when. The challenge lies in ensuring that adoption is sustainable, cost-effective, and delivers genuine benefits.

The skills gap is real, but it need not be a barrier. With clear objectives, pilot projects, investment in team capability, and the right external support, SMEs can harness AI effectively and position their finance function as a strategic engine for growth.

Solicitor of the month...

David Low

Partner, Swinburne Maddison LLP.

What inspired you to pursue a career in law, and what path did you take to become a Solicitor?

At school, I was advised to pursue either Law or Medicine due to strong academic results. Being squeamish ruled out Medicine, so Law became the natural choice. I discovered my passion during my Law degree at the University of Leeds, followed by the Legal Practice Course in York.

Like many, securing a Training Contract was tough, I took a year out to travel and work aboard Cunard Cruise Liners before joining Swinburne Maddison LLP in Litigation, where I've stayed ever since.

What are the most common legal issues people seek advice on, and how do you help them?

We deal with a huge variety of disputes, from private individuals and corporate clients including property, contracts, commercial disputes, harassment or defamation. The most frequent issues I receive involve property rights, such as boundary disputes and Landlord and Tenant matters.

My philosophy has always been to understand the client's goals at the outset and mapping out a legal and practical route to achieve them, often working with experts like Surveyors to provide clear, comprehensive advice.

What are the biggest misconceptions people have about solicitors and the legal system?

A common misconception is that Solicitors only care about their own fees. While it's true that private legal services can be expensive, the profession is full of hardworking, diligent and passionate lawyers who consistently go above and beyond for their clients. This commitment isn't limited to those offering Legal Aid or pro bono support, it's evident across the entire profession. Working in law, especially in Litigation, can be highly stressful, but Solicitors genuinely care about the people they represent.

What advice would you give to someone facing a legal dispute for the first time?

Take advice early and keep things in proportion. Delaying legal help often complicates matters. Focus on your end goal and try to remove emotion from decisions. A good lawyer helps you stay objective and make informed choices throughout the process.

How do you handle the emotional and ethical challenges of your job?

The emotional challenges of the job are numerous. While switching off and maintaining work-life balance is important, having a supportive team you can speak openly with is essential. Sharing challenges with colleagues who understand the pressures makes a real difference.

Ethical challenges are less common due to the profession's strict regulations, but when they do arise, I'm fortunate to have a close-knit Dispute Resolution Team to discuss matters with and consider different perspectives.

What impact has technology had on the legal industry, and how do you see it evolving?

Technology has changed how we work, communicate and interact with the courts. Tools like digital dictation, AI, and online portals are now standard. It is pretty much impossible to contribute meaningfully within the profession if you are not keeping up with technological advances.

In terms of the future evolution, the court system still needs significant investment to modernise and meet current demands.

What are the key qualities that make a great Solicitor?

In my opinion, the key qualities that make a great Solicitor are these three skills - communication, emotional intelligence, and analytical thinking. These ensure that clients feel heard, understood and well-supported while their case is handled with technical expertise.

Clients want someone they can trust and relate to, so even the most academically gifted lawyer will struggle to deliver great service without strong communication and relationship-building skills.

What is the most rewarding part of being a Solicitor, and what keeps you motivated?

The most rewarding part of being a Solicitor is undoubtedly helping clients achieve their goals and receiving a simple thank you at the end of a case. The most challenging and emotive matters often bring the greatest satisfaction.

Litigation is inherently uncertain, and while we can't offer guarantees, we use our experience and expertise to guide clients toward the best possible outcome. Clients rarely seek out Litigators unless there's a problem, but I'm a problem solver and that's what motivates me every day.

Using your trade mark matters

Registration of trade marks is a powerful first step in protecting your brands. Registration gives you the exclusive right to use your trade marks in connection with your goods and services, but those rights must be actively maintained.

Most jurisdictions require that trade marks are put to genuine use within a set time period following registration, typically a five year period. Failure to do so can expose the registration to a revocation action, meaning that third parties can apply to have your registration cancelled.

Genuine trade mark use needs to be real, consistent use in the marketplace, in relation to the goods and/or services for which the mark was registered. The trade mark should appear on product labels, packaging, advertising and marketing materials in a way that clearly identifies it as your brand.

Proof of use can also be essential during trade mark renewal. Trade marks are typically renewed every ten years and some countries, such as the United States, require evidence of use to be submitted with the renewal application. Collecting this evidence regularly, such as sales records, copies of advertisements and product photographs, can make the renewal process much smoother.

Brexit added an extra layer of complexity for brand owners. When the UK left the EU, EU trade marks (EUTMs) no longer covered the UK. To preserve protection, the UK Intellectual Property Office automatically created comparable UK trade marks for existing EU trade mark registrations on 1 January 2021, at no cost to trade mark owners. However, these new UK registrations become vulnerable to non-use challenges from 1 January 2026, so businesses should ensure they are used in the UK before the end of 2025 to keep them secure. The reverse is also true for EUTMs - use in the UK no longer constitutes 'use in the EU' for the purposes of maintaining EUTM registrations.

In short, registration of trade marks is just the beginning. Using and documenting their use ensures you retain control of these valuable assets.

After all the birdies, pars (and some missed putts!!) everyone gathered in the clubhouse for a well-earned meal, drinks and the prize giving.

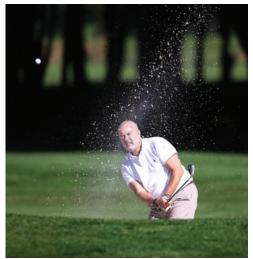

Its steel pans are currently stored in a side room off the school hall, meaning they have to be taken out and packed away at the start of every practice session, which shortens the amount of time available for the pupils to play.

But now, plans to install a new modular building into the school playground in which they will be permanently set up and available for pupils to play whenever they want are moving forward, with an £8,000 grant from regional employer the Banks Group's Banks Community Fund taking the school past its £40,000 fundraising target.

Existing projects include the Ability Counts League which provides competitive opportunities for adults with learning difficulties; and Your Move which welcomes young people aged 13–17 who are managing long-term or acute health conditions that may make participating in traditional football environments more difficult.

NFA's Community Fund aims to keep people playing football despite financial or other barriers – for example providing boots for children whose families are facing hardship; sports goggles for visually impaired players or access to mental health support.

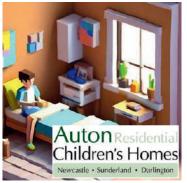

Why was the charity formed?

Chuf was founded by parents and clinicians at the Freeman Hospital in Newcastle in the early 1980s with one powerful goal – to make life better for children and families facing congenital and acquired heart disease. What began as a small group raising funds for lifesaving equipment has grown into a regional lifeline, offering practical, emotional, and lifelong support to thousands of families.

Today, Chuf's vision is simple but profound: to inspire hope and enable every Heart Hero to reach their full potential. Whether it's funding cutting-edge medical equipment, supporting pioneering research, or ensuring families have a place to rest during hospital stays with all of the essentials they need, Chuf makes every heartbeat count.

Which area do you cover?

While Chuf's roots are in Newcastle's Freeman Hospital – home to one of the UK's leading paediatric cardiac centres – their reach now spans the entire North East and Cumbria network of hospitals. From the tiniest babies in neonatal units to adults living with congenital heart conditions, Chuf's impact touches lives across the region and those from across the UK receiving care in specialists North East and Cumbria hospital units.

In 2024/25 alone, Chuf committed £890,000 to projects and initiatives that bring comfort, care, and innovation to heart families. From providing over 5,500 meals to parents staying close to their child's bedside to funding new echocardiography machines that transform diagnosis and treatment, their presence is felt in every ward and waiting room.

What type of fundraising events do you do?

Fundraising for Chuf takes many forms, from skydives and golf days, to corporate challenges and gala dinners. Each event celebrates the incredible strength of the Heart Hero community and the generosity of those who rally behind them.

Chuf's Changemakers programme is a growing network of compassionate corporate supporters who are helping to shape the future of cardiac care. Businesses across the region raise funds, take on volunteer time, and champion Chuf's mission.

What are you currently working on?

Chuf's current focus is on deepening its impact across three strategic pillars:

Holistic Care – supporting the whole family, not just the patient, through initiatives like meal vouchers, washbags for emergency admissions, and the continuation of vCreate, a video messaging platform that keeps parents connected to their child's care.

Lifelong Support – ensuring that Heart Heroes are supported through every stage of life, from childhood into adulthood.

Innovation – funding pioneering medical equipment and research that go beyond NHS resources, helping medics deliver world-class care.

What does the future hold?

The future for Chuf is one of growth, advocacy, and connection. With a new long-term strategy in place, the charity is working to expand support across every hospital in the North East and Cumbria, broaden psychological wellbeing services, and continue investing in life-changing innovation.

As Charlotte Campbell explains: "This strategy isn't just about funding care – it's about standing shoulder to shoulder with families for life. Our Heart Heroes deserve not just to survive, but to thrive."

Navigating Personal Transition

Over the past two years, I've had countless conversations with leaders about their future. It often begins with: "I've got one more role in me," "I've got ten years left," or "I'm not sure what's next." What starts as a career convsersation often evolves into something deeper; an exploration of life path, identity, and purpose.

This reflection can happen at any stage, but it's most common during life transitions: children leaving home, caring for or losing elderly parents, illness, relationship changes, redundancy, menopause. And yes, I see this just as much in men as in women; it's not gender specific.

After decades of investing in our careers, we may find ourselves feeling uncomfortable in the coat we've worn for years. The role that once defined us no longer fits. We feel disconnected, uncertain, or simply changed. This is a natural phase, a sign we're entering a new chapter.

Life mirrors our career more than we realise, and we rarely talk about it holistically. Richard Barrett, a thought leader in values-based leadership, outlines seven stages of psychological development from birth to 60+. Each stage brings a different motivator:

- Childhood (0-24): These three stages are about surviving and growing as youngsters. We need love, acceptance and belonging from our family, and recognition as individuals for what we bring as we grow to early adulthood.
- Middle years (25–49): In the first part of this period we seek independence, freedom and autonomy, and to be recognised as ourselves. Towards the latter stage it's about Integrity, becoming more fully who we are and finding meaning and purpose
- Later years (50–60+): These final two stages move us to integrating and giving back. Finding our real purpose where we can make a contribution and serve others. So it's no surprise that our focus and

So it's no surprise that our focus and motivation evolve. What mattered in our



30s may not matter now. The identity we built may no longer serve us. The question becomes: how do we navigate this transition well? Bar getting yourself a coach, who can act as the objective sounding board to enable you to explore this, I'd also advise you to reflect on the following.

1.Identify your vision of the future

- Think beyond job titles. Where are you living? What's your lifestyle? Who are you with? How do you feel? What's your home like?
- Are you working full-time, part-time, from home, or in an office? What are you doing, and with whom? How much are you earning? Yes, we'll have that uncomfortable conversation—because without clarity on finances, how can you plan the next step? A financial plan alongside a life and career plan is essential.
- What are your hobbies? Who do you spend time with? What do you want freedom for—and freedom from?

2. Decide what's important now.

 Consider all aspects of your life—work, family, hobbies, friends, community,

- faith, personal development, fitness. Every person's list will differ.
- Rank your satisfaction in each on a scale of 1-10.
- Then ask: which of these are part of your future vision? What needs attention now to create the balance you want?

3. Map out a path from current to future state.

Once you know where you're heading, you can start creating a plan. That might mean staying in your current role while finding fulfilment elsewhere, or making one or two shifts to reach your vision. What matters is knowing your direction and taking steps toward it

And don't do it alone. Bring those who matter into the conversation—it impacts them too. And dream big. Future you will thank you for it!

- **9. Check your progress** shift your objectives to keep them aligned with your overall personal and professional goals.



10. Collect feedback – yes it can be uncomfortable, yes it can be a little awkward, but with feedback you can reflect review, develop and shine.

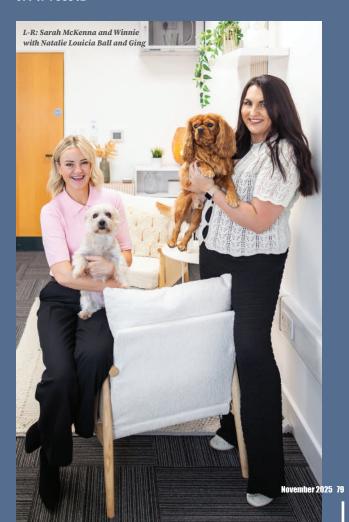

What crisis?

Dr David Cliff reflects upon how our obsession with expression has left us more disconnected than ever.

Mental health problems are now so common they are constantly referred to in the news. Every major event is reported through the prism of emotion. The journalist's first question is no longer what happened but how did you feel when it did? We have moved from fact to feeling as our dominant form of meaning.

Therapy culture and social media have joined forces to make public disclosure the new virtue. We are urged to "share," "open up," "express," yet our emotional fluency has become a spectacle. The vaccine debates and endless waves of intersectional outrage online show how easily emotion now shapes public truth.

How experience is framed matters. It can enlighten, misinform and evoke fear and hatred. Evolution made us alert to danger, so bad news attracts attention. Good news feels like a distraction from our programmed vigilance. But our chronic focus on threat is exhausting; it feeds anxiety while posing as realism.

Mental health has also become

professionalised. Informal care — the neighbourly ear or family conversation — has given way to referral and liability. We increasingly outsource empathy to experts. Society has become a crowd of spectators watching its own distress, eager to comment but hesitant to connect.

In this climate, success replaces meaning. The market defines value, and those who live quietly or modestly are cast as underachievers. Social media magnifies the hierarchy. It was meant to connect us; instead, it isolates, radicalises, and rewards performative outrage. The screen, not the self, increasingly decides who we are.

Technology both enables and impoverishes us. Young people fluent in texting may struggle with conversation. Many workplaces report staff unwilling to call clients — safer to email than risk a human exchange. The very tools that promise connection drain our capacity for presence.

Freedom of speech is narrowing too. Ordinary opinions can now attract legal or social punishment, while real crime may receive less police attention. People censor themselves not from civility but fear of having an opinion that will offend or prompt threat. The paradoxical result is an expressive society that quietly represses the individual.

Children are raised on tablets and influencers proffer guidance from charisma instead of character. They learn that confidence sells better than competence.

Those who profit from this attention economy shape identity as entertainment. Meanwhile, technological change races ahead. Artificial intelligence, once futuristic, now reorganises work within months. Whole professions are being redefined. The few who master these systems gain extraordinary power; the rest are left attending catch-up seminars. Economic evolution has become revolution.

As the Greek economist Yanis Varoufakis observes, we are sliding toward 'technofeudalism'. Data is the new land; our attention, the rent. We volunteer our privacy and time to platforms that shape our desires and feed our fears. The reward is belonging — the punishment, obscurity. So we scroll, post, and perform. We fear missing out more than losing ourselves.

missing out more than losing ourselves. We fear the opinions of others even more (FOPO). In chasing connection, we have lost community; in expressing everything, we have said almost nothing.

The real crisis isn't only mental health—it's existential. We have become so busy articulating feelings that we've forgotten how to feel them, so obsessed with connection that we've forgotten how to relate.

What crisis? Ours. The one we no longer have time to notice.

Time for the Government to step up and offer a period of stability for businesses

The past year has been challenging for many businesses; there's no way to sugarcoat it.

Rachel Reeves' first budget landed with a thud, even after being heavily trailed in the media beforehand, sending shockwaves through the business community. Difficult times followed for many, both in the immediate aftermath of the Treasury announcement and in the run-up to the new financial year, with all its proposed tax changes.

In April 2025, businesses faced the triple tax whammy of an increase in the national minimum wage, a rise in employers' National Insurance Contributions, and a cut in business rates relief. These tax increases struck hard, coming as they did at the end of a run of global challenges, including the energy price hikes caused by the war in Ukraine and the ongoing struggle to regain stability after the Covid crisis.

It was no coincidence or surprise that between January and April this year, Newcastle saw the untimely demise of several prominent hospitality businesses that fell victim to these pressures.

Thankfully, the worst appears to be over, and the city's economy has stabilised. There are even some positive signs of recovery. Spending figures for August and September in the city were cautiously encouraging, revealing that Newcastle is in a healthier economic shape than other comparable UK cities and has been performing up to 12% better than the UK benchmark in recent months.

It is a testament to the hard work and ingenuity of our city centre businesses, especially those in the hospitality and leisure sectors, that they have managed to steady their own ships. Using creativity and a deep knowledge of their businesses, they have tightened their belts and made the best of a bad situation. We are blessed in Newcastle with a host of long-established, independent businesses, especially in our much-envied hospitality scene. They are not afraid of hard work and are adept at pivoting, adjusting their businesses to deal with whatever is thrown at them.

Navigating these turbulent times has taken great fortitude – but businesses have exhausted their reserves. Now what they need and the city needs is a period of stability and economic certainty.

With the next Budget looming, we are calling on the Government to avoid any more sweeping changes and not to place an even higher burden on customers or businesses.

It is crucial that this autumn, the Chancellor delivers stability alongside some well-targeted support, particularly for those industries that have borne the brunt of recent challenges. Hospitality, retail and leisure are the backbone of our cities and communities. They need meaningful help to ensure that they are not merely surviving, but are thriving. These sectors are among the nation's largest employers, and supporting them is essential to safeguard jobs and drive economic recovery and growth.

We have two main asks of the Government: firstly, to reduce VAT for the hospitality sector. The UK is one of the only places in Europe to charge the same rate of VAT for hospitality as other sectors, and it is crippling the industry. Cutting VAT would send a clear signal that the government supports the hospitality industry and would boost business confidence. Businesses could then decide whether to pass on the VAT savings to customers in the form of lower prices or retain more of the income from sales to boost cash flow, which would provide a muchneeded lifeline at a time when margins are razor-thin. A permanent VAT reduction could also protect thousands of jobs and encourage long-term investment.

Business Rates relief for all retail, hospitality and leisure businesses, the cornerstone of our high streets, is our second key recommendation.

A business rates review, coupled with a proposed 'supertax' on properties with a rateable value of £500,000 or more, is rumoured to be in the chancellor's red box. These proposals are fuelling great uncertainty among businesses and prompting warnings that large retailers, especially those much-loved staples of the high street, would be adversely affected by these proposed changes, with disastrous consequences. Store closures, hundreds of job losses and ultimately higher prices for customers would be the inevitable result of hikes in business rates for large high street tenants. The loss of these major anchor tenants would have a domino effect, leading to more vacant units and a further decline in UK city centre high streets. By contrast, extending business rates relief to all hospitality, leisure and retail businesses regardless of their size or rateable value would provide much-needed support, helping these sectors to thrive. Reducing tax burdens would also encourage investment and expansion.

Businesses have done all they can to weather the recent economic storms. They now need Government support to move forward, restore economic stability and lay the foundations for future growth and expansion.

A survival guide - The Office **Christmas Party**

November means that many organisations are currently planning for the annual office Christmas party, the mix of high spirits and free-flowing alcohol can sometimes lead to HR headaches.

If you are organising this year's soirée, fear not! We have created a comprehensive guide to ensure your office Christmas party goes off without a hitch.

Setting the tone: Behaviour and alcohol policies

First things first, it is crucial to set clear guidelines for behaviour. Remind your staff that the office Christmas party is an extension of the workplace, meaning all company codes of conduct apply. Exercise caution when it comes to an open bar. While it is generous to provide free drinks, offering a variety of non-alcoholic options is equally important.

Harassment

Unfortunately one topic which re-occurs for Christmas parties is conduct and sexual harassment, which can be both verbal and physical. This can even include commenting on someone's clothing or appearance.

Given the presence of alcohol and the misconception that the party does not count as "work", some people can forget themselves and at times behave highly inappropriately, particularly if tensions that have been simmering during the year finally come to the fore, with inhibitions lowered because of alcohol.

It would be a good idea for the employer to set out well ahead of time to all employees that Christmas parties are an extension of the workplace, regardless of where they occur. This would require conduct to be kept the same as it would be in the workplace, a clear reminder of what is and is not acceptable behaviour and consequences which could occur such as disciplinary action potentially leading to dismissal for the most serious of offences.

The Worker Protection (Amendment of Equality Act 2010) Act 2023 placed a legal obligation on employers to take "reasonable steps" to prevent their employees from experiencing sexual harassment. Under the 2023 Act, the Employment Tribunal can now increase compensation awards for sexual harassment claims by up to 25% if

- sexual harassment has taken place; and
- the employer failed to take reasonable steps to prevent sexual harassment.

You should refer to your risk assessment on preventing sexual harassment in the workplace.

Social media

In today's digital age, social media can turn festivities into a PR nightmare if not managed properly. Establish firm guidelines about what can and cannot be shared online. Now would be an excellent opportunity to remind everyone of the company's social media policy.

Inclusivity matters

When planning entertainment, think about inclusivity. Consider the diverse backgrounds and beliefs of your employees. Choose activities that cater to a broad audience, ensuring everyone can participate comfortably.

Managing absences

If your event falls on a weekday, be transparent about expectations for the following workday.

Consider flexible work hours or a later start time to accommodate those who might need a bit of extra rest.

Top Tips for Success:

- 1. Clear communication: Provide explicit guidelines on expected behaviour, emphasising the professional nature of the
- 2. Travel arrangements: Encourage attendees to plan their journeys home in advance, perhaps even arranging prebooked taxis for their convenience.
- 3. Diverse refreshments: Ensure a range of beverages, including non-alcoholic options, to cater to all preferences.
- 4. Social media policies: Reiterate the rules about social media usage during and after the event.
- 5. Inclusive entertainment: Choose activities that are inclusive and respectful of diverse cultural and religious backgrounds.
- 6. Respect attendance choice: Make it known that attendance is optional, understanding that personal beliefs or prior commitments might prevent some employees from attending.

Learning to let go

When I talk to business owners about why they started, freedom is usually in the mix.

Freedom to do things their way. Freedom to choose how they spend their time. Freedom to build something that gives them more options in life, not fewer.

But what I often see is the very opposite.

It was about letting go.

I had to trust the guides who knew the mountain better than I ever could. I had to accept the pace, even when it felt painfully slow. And I had to lean on the team around me when the altitude made every step harder.

If I'd tried to control every aspect – the route, the timing, the outcome - I doubt I'd have made it. Letting go wasn't a weakness. It was the only way forward.

And it's exactly the same in business.

We tell ourselves that holding on keeps us safe. That if we stay across every detail, nothing can go wrong. But truthfully, businesses are stronger when they aren't dependent on one person. When systems carry the load, when teams know what



they're responsible for, when decisions don't all flow through one pair of hands.

That's where freedom comes from. Not in walking away completely, but in knowing you could if you wanted to. In knowing the business would keep moving, clients would still be served, and your team would know what to do without you there every minute.

I meet so many owners at this crossroads. They've built something impressive, but it relies completely on them. Growth feels too heavy, standing still feels frustrating, and stepping back feels impossible.

Is your business compliant with harassment laws?



October marked the first anniversary of the enhanced laws protecting workers against harassment and sexual harassment in the workplace.

The ones where you have a duty to take reasonable steps to prevent it; with further penalties where harassment occurs and your preventative measures are found wanting.

Recent analysis of Acas call data in the first six months of this year (so shortly after the introduction of the Worker Protection Act), found that they had risen from 4,001 to 5,583 when compared to the same period the year before. It is not clear yet how this is translating into employment tribunal rulings – it is too early.

The forthcoming and expansive Employment Rights Bill is set to make the obligations on employers more onerous still.

Harassment and sexual harassment law in 2025

The law change in October 2024 required you to anticipate when sexual harassment (or any harassment) might occur and take reasonable steps to prevent it. If it occurs anyway, you should take further steps to prevent it from happening again.

Before a claim can be made against you

for your preventative duties, harassment or sexual harassment must have occurred and your employee brought a claim in an employment tribunal.

If they are successful, the judge will automatically assess whether you are guilty of also failing to take reasonable preventative steps. If they adjudicate that you were, then they can uplift the compensation by up to 25%.

The Equality and Human Rights Commission (EHRC) can also directly enforce this law.

What further changes will happen?

As you probably know, the Employment Rights Bill is wide-ranging. It is being implemented in different stages over three years, starting in 2025. The measures pertinent to this topic will mainly be introduced in 2026. They are as follows:

- From April 2026, reporting sexual harassment will be explicitly included within whistleblowing legislation.
- From October 2026, the word "ALL" is being added to the preventative requirement – "All reasonable steps to prevent workplace sexual harassment."
- From October 2026, your liability will be extended to include third party harassment and sexual harassment.
- The use of NDAs will be restricted so that they cannot prevent workers from disclosing harassment or discrimination.
 A date has not been set for this.

By adding the word "ALL" to the preventative requirement, it beefs up what is expected. But there is currently no

definition of what reasonable steps should be. This may be addressed in the future after consultation.

What should you be doing now?

Having a harassment and sexual harassment policy is a must. It sets out what acceptable behaviour is in black and white and gives you the framework to investigate and discipline where necessary. Any tribunal judge would take a dim view where this was not present.

Keeping a risk assessment on file and demonstrable employee training on the subject are good, proactive ideas too.

Training can educate employees in how to behave, how to respond as a victim and how to intervene as a witness or manager.

Depending on the nature of your business, visible signs saying that harassment and sexual harassment are not acceptable may be appropriate too – particularly in public facing businesses such as in hospitality.

To get ready for third-party liability, all the above should be reviewed to ensure it reflects this upcoming change. More specifically you might look at putting harassment clauses into contracts with suppliers to further protect against third-party liability.

A relevant warning

The futurist Alvin Toffler once wrote: 'The illiterate of the 21st century will not be those who cannot read and write, but those who cannot learn, unlearn and relearn'.

In a world as fast-moving as ours, that warning feels more relevant than ever.

MIT senior lecturer Peter Senge explored this idea in his influential book The Fifth Discipline, which introduced the concept of the learning organisation.

Imagine if your business had a genuine culture of learning where every person, at every level, was deliberately and consistently developing. Where each week, your team turned up slightly better than the week prior.

When that happens, magic occurs. People begin to push themselves and each other

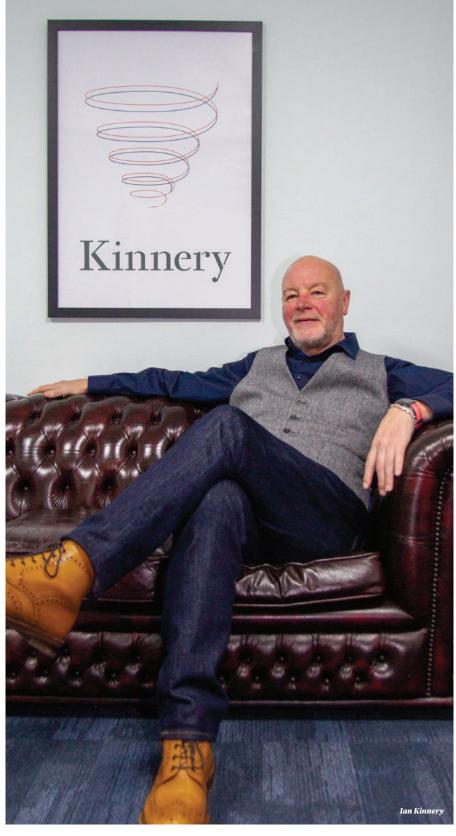
The whole organisation starts to feel different. Energy builds. Confidence grows. And results are achieved.

Creating that kind of culture doesn't require big budgets or complicated programmes.

One of my clients started with a simple book club, where a small group read a relevant business title and met to discuss what they'd learned and how it might apply to their work.

The idea caught on.

Soon there were four or five book clubs running across the business. This was an engineering firm, and the enthusiasm even spread to the shop floor.



Another company introduced a weekly 'lunch and learn,' where staff gathered to watch a short video or listen to a talk from an expert on a leadership topic.

One made their Amazon account available for anyone who wanted to buy educational books. Another paid for access to an online learning platform for all employees.

No one was made to participate, but there was a clear expectation that everyone was responsible for their own growth.

And those who chose not to engage quickly realised they might be left behind when promotion opportunities arose.

None of this is hard or expensive to do. But the benefits of building a true learning organisation are immense.

So, what are you going to do about it?

The Great Skills Mismatch

Bryony Gibson, director of Bryony Gibson Consulting, looks at why the North East has thousands of jobs going spare and thousands of people looking for work, but the two can't seem to find each other.

In recruitment, we often hear people, including myself, talking about the impact the cost-of-living has on the job market. It's that, or people's desire to work remotely, or the pace of change AI drives.

They are important issues, but there's also another problem quietly sitting behind them. One that might be the biggest challenge we face in the North East. We have a major skills mismatch.

The fact is that what employers want and what candidates offer doesn't align, and it's only getting worse. In the North East, almost 60% of job vacancies are classified "hard to fill". In more than a third of those, employers say it's down to "a lack of the right skills or experience".

It's the same across the UK, where roughly 33% of vacancies are deemed "skills shortages". So it's not that there aren't jobs. Or that there aren't people. It's that we've built an environment where the two don't match.

In my world of practice accountancy, this plays out daily. Firms are desperate for talent, but can't take just anyone. Entry is largely based on technical experience, but once through the door, it's the softer skills that make the difference. Work placements and early career experiences can be invaluable, giving people exposure to real situations that help build competence and confidence. Firms need the right qualifications, but also people who can communicate effectively, are tech-savvy, and can build client relationships. What I see is that the problem isn't always ability, it's readiness. And it's not unique to accounting.

What's going wrong?

Partly, it's how we prepare people for work. Education and training still focus on exams



and theory, when employers want people who can solve problems, think on their feet, and cope with the complexity of the real world.

The recent Government changes to apprenticeship funding will make things even harder. The Level 7 apprenticeship is the route to ACA and ACCA qualifications and is now only funded for under-21s. That means graduates and career changers are no longer eligible for support, leaving firms to shoulder the full cost. Unsurprisingly, many can't afford it. It's a short-sighted policy that risks cutting off a vital pipeline of future accountants, right when we need them most.

There's also a growing gap in expectations. Candidates value flexibility, balance, and purpose more than ever, but not every business has caught up. Those who keep rigid hours, outdated progression paths, and company cultures that don't move with the times inevitably lose good people.

What needs to change

There's no single fix, but there are a few things that I believe could make a difference:

Open up more pathways in -

apprenticeships, trainee schemes, and work placements offer people a chance to build experience, not just qualifications. Companies need to embrace this more.

Keep skills current - employers can't expect recruits to come ready-made and continuously upskill themselves. Investment in training has to be part of the deal.

Update perceptions - we need to talk more honestly about what modern jobs look like. When the perception hasn't caught up with the way a role has evolved, people misunderstand what it entails, and that keeps potential talent away.

Final thought

The "Great Skills Mismatch" isn't just about hiring headaches. It's about missed opportunities for businesses, people, and, especially, for places like the North East that have so much untapped potential.

There's no shortage of ambition here, but we can't fix the skills gap until we fix how people get the skills. Until we match what people can do, want to do, and what employers need, we'll keep missing opportunities that are right in front of us.

Outdoors: The Leadership Performance Tool

"The world glorifies hustle. But the smartest leaders know that time for thinking and reflection drives real performance."

"I see it every week," says Jane, smiling.

"Leaders working harder. Non-stop days, cluttered with interruptions, firefighting and noise. The constant pressure draining focus and judgement. But the fix isn't another meeting; it's a change of environment."

For Jane Fisher, founder of Fresh Perspectives North East, the outdoors isn't a perk, it's a leadership performance tool.

"It's not about slowing down," she adds. "It's about speeding up the right way. Getting outdoors strips away distraction, stimulates innovative thinking and resets fatigue to sharpen judgements and strengthen strategies."

Jane's advice? "Stop waiting for the big away day! Use small steps daily: take a short strategy walk, a call on the move, a step outside before big decisions. For habit is where performance builds."

Surrounded by idiots? Or just people who think differently?

"Treat others as they want to be treated - not as you would want to be treated."

If you've ever sat in a meeting thinking, "Why don't they get it?" — you're not alone.

Probation Periods: Why employers need to get ahead now

Hiring a new employee always carries some risk. No matter how rigorous your recruitment process, it's often not until someone is in the role that you truly know if they're the right fit. That's why probation periods are so valuable — for both employer and employee.

Probation allows for a defined period—typically three to six months—to assess performance, culture fit, and conduct before confirming permanent employment. When well-managed, it helps employers make confident hiring decisions while supporting new starters to succeed.

Why use a probation period?

Although employees currently need two years' service to claim unfair dismissal, probation periods still serve an important purpose.

They:

- Allow for shorter notice periods during the early weeks
- Encourage clearer performance monitoring
- Help set structured expectations from the start
- Provide a clearer route for early exit if needed

This phase also prompts managers to give more active feedback, rather than waiting for problems to build up over time.

What to Include in Contracts

A strong probation clause should set out:

- The length of the probation period
- Notice periods during and after probation
- Whether standard performance or disciplinary processes apply
- The right to extend probation, and in what circumstances
- That probation must be confirmed in writing when successfully passed

Some businesses also delay certain non-



statutory benefits — like enhanced sick pay or bonuses — until probation is passed, as long as statutory entitlements are still met.

Supporting performance during probation

Even though employees on probation can't claim ordinary unfair dismissal, they still have protection against discrimination, whistleblowing retaliation, or automatic unfair dismissal.

To minimise risk, treat probation as a supportive and documented process. Good practice includes:

- Setting clear goals and expectations
- Holding review meetings (e.g. monthly or at key points)
- Offering training or mentoring if needed
- Documenting performance feedback and support given

Not only does this help underperformers improve — it protects your business if dismissal becomes necessary.

When probation isn't working

If things aren't going to plan, you don't have to wait until the end of the period to act. But make sure you've raised concerns, offered support, and kept records.

If the employee still doesn't meet expectations, follow a simple and fair process:

- Invite them to a probation review meeting in writing
- Share your concerns and explain dismissal is being considered
- Allow them to bring a companion
- Hold the meeting, listen to their response, and adjourn before making your decision

 Confirm everything in writing and document the process

Extensions can be useful in cases of absence or borderline performance — but they must be justified and communicated clearly, especially where health or disability is involved. Mismanaging this could lead to claims of unfair treatment.

Looking ahead: Probation may soon become law

The government plans to replace the twoyear unfair dismissal qualifying period with a formal statutory probation period (called an "initial period of employment"). The likely length? Nine months, followed by a longer notice period. While the change isn't due before 2027, employers should start preparing now.

That means reviewing:

- Whether managers are holding probation reviews on time
- If performance issues are being documented
- Whether new starters are getting the support they need
- If managers are trained to manage performance effectively

Final tip

Encourage managers to schedule and stick to reviews, reschedule if needed, and keep a clear paper trail. A probation period should be more than just a tick-box — it's your chance to build strong foundations and avoid future problems.

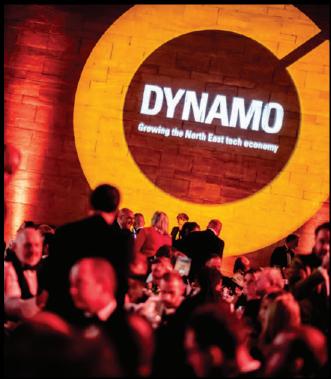

Building a legacy

Paul Callaghan's impact on the North East Tech Sector

Paul Callaghan is a transformative leader who has shaped the North East's technology sector for over three decades. As co-founder of the Leighton Group and the visionary behind Sunderland Software City, he has created globally successful tech businesses while driving collaboration, skills, and innovation across the region.

Paul – who has recently been shortlisted for the Tech Leader category in the 2025 Dynamites Awards – is a tireless advocate, mentor, and champion of entrepreneurship. Paul's passion and influence have made him a driving force behind the North East tech sector – building new businesses, seeding new ventures and championing education, culture and economic growth in the region.

Here, he reflects on his career so far, his proudest achievements, and what makes the North East so special.

You've achieved a lot in your career Paul – can you tell us how you got started?

I grew up in Sunderland in the 1960s, at a time when the region was vibrant but also heavily reliant on traditional industries. By the late 1980s, when the internet was beginning to emerge, I could see that it had the potential to change everything.

In 1992, I co-founded Leighton with my brother, Gerard. At the time, businesses had very little understanding of what the internet could do for them and that's where Leighton came in. We built some of the region's earliest websites, teaching companies how to get online and offering digital training.

A few years later, in 1995, we launched DomainNames.com. This was long before search engines became dominant, so having the right domain name was critical. The business grew quickly and became one of Europe's largest domain registrars. When it was sold to US NASDAQ 100 company – VeriSign – in 2000, it not only gave me valuable international experience but also provided the capital and credibility to back further ventures when I returned to the North East. Through the 2000s and 2010s, Leighton evolved into what became the Leighton Group. We incubated and spun out

Through the 2000s and 2010s, Leighton evolved into what became the Leighton Group. We incubated and spun out a series of software businesses that went on to achieve international success. Among them were 4Projects, a global construction collaboration platform; Communicator, one of the UK's first SaaS email marketing tools; WorkCast, a virtual events platform; and SaleCycle, a behavioural marketing business recognised worldwide. Each of these created jobs here in the North East, but just as importantly, they created a new generation of entrepreneurs and business leaders. That ecosystem effect – seeing people I worked with go on to build their own successful careers – has been one of the most rewarding parts of my journey.



Tell us more about Leighton today.

Leighton today is a very different business than the one we started over 30 years ago. It has matured into a leading software consultancy specialising in AWS and it works with some of the biggest names in the UK including British Airways, Greggs, Hays Travel and Atom Bank.

In 2025 we hit record revenues and were recognised in the ORESA Growth Index as one of the UK's Top 100 Fastest Growing Businesses. That's a huge source of pride for me because it shows that a company founded here, and still headquartered here, can compete at the very top level nationally.

But, what I'm most proud of is the culture we've built. Some of our colleagues have been with us for over 20 years, which tells you something about the environment we've created. Leighton has always been about putting people first, providing opportunities, developing talent and showing that you can have a fulfilling tech career without leaving the North East. It's something we do well and will hopefully continue to do for years to come.

We know you've done a lot outside of your day-to-day roles, can you tell us a bit about those?

From early on, I realised that running a business and growing an economy aren't separate things. If you want companies to thrive, you need the right infrastructure, networks, and support systems around them. That's why I've always given my time to initiatives beyond my own ventures.

I was a founding director of the Entrepreneurs' Forum and later became Chair of Business Link North East, then Chair of One North East, the regional development agency. I also chaired RTC North, helping support innovation in STEM.

In 2007, I was heavily involved in the creation of Sunderland Software City – a project I'm particularly proud of. At that time, Sunderland was still grappling with the decline of its traditional industries, and we believed that software could be a foundation for economic renewal. We secured investment, built partnerships, and persuaded people to believe in our vision of Sunderland as a digital hub. Today, Sunderland Software City stands as proof of what can be achieved when you combine ambition with collaboration.

Nationally, I also served as Chair of Chairs for England's Regional Development Agencies and was a Commissioner for the Northern Economic Futures Commission. More locally, I chaired the Sunderland Economic Leadership Board and the Newcastle Gateshead Initiative. All of these roles gave me the chance to champion the region, attract investment, ensuring the North East has a strong national voice in digital policy.

You have spent a lot of time championing access to education, can you tell us why that's so important to you?

For me, education is absolutely fundamental. If you want a strong economy, you need a skilled workforce and that means aligning education with industry.

I was Chair of the University of Sunderland for over a decade, which gave me a platform to ensure that what students were learning translated into real career opportunities. I was also the Founding Chair and Lead Sponsor of Red House Academy and later a Trustee of the Northern Education Trust. Each of these roles gave me the chance to influence how education connects to employment, particularly in digital industries.

I've always believed that for the region to thrive, we need three things: a thriving economy, strong education, and a vibrant culture. Those three pillars reinforce each other. Education provides the talent, the economy provides the opportunities, and culture makes the region somewhere people want to live and stay.

That's why I've also invested time in cultural initiatives. I've chaired Live Theatre, the Sunderland MAC Trust and the Newcastle Gateshead Initiative, supporting arts and community projects that enrich lives here in the North East. If you want to attract the best people to work in tech here, they need to see the region as a place that's not just about jobs, but about quality of life.

You've achieved so much in your 30-year career, what stands out the most for you?

There have been so many highlights, but a few really stand out. Building Leighton from scratch into one of the region's longest established and most successful technology businesses is something I'll always be proud of. Seeing it

thrive more than three decades later, still growing and still innovating, gives me real satisfaction.

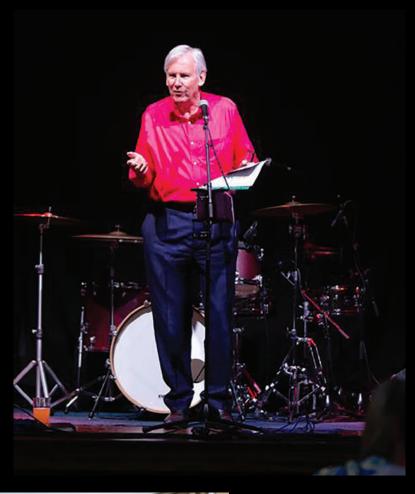
Equally, the spinouts we nurtured – 4Projects, Communicator, WorkCast, and SaleCycle – have gone on to become international businesses that employ hundreds of people and act as flagships for North East tech. Knowing that they all started here, and that we played a part in their journeys, is immensely rewarding.

The creation of Sunderland Software City was another defining moment. At a time when people doubted whether Sunderland could reinvent itself, we built an ecosystem that proved it could. Today it's a thriving hub for start-ups and digital innovation, and that's something that will endure far beyond my own career.

On a personal note, being awarded a CBE in 2012 for Services to the North East, and receiving lifetime achievement awards from both the Entrepreneurs' Forum and the North East Business Awards, were very humbling moments. But the real reward has been the people I've worked with and the connections I've made with colleagues, partners, and entrepreneurs. Those people have continued to inspire me every step of the way.

So why the North East - what makes it special to you?

For me, the North East is home. It's where I grew up, where my family is, and where I wanted to build businesses that would make a difference. In fact, Leighton was named after the street I grew up on and it's a reminder that no matter how far we've grown, our roots are firmly here.





What makes the region special is its people. There's a resilience, a creativity, and a willingness to collaborate that you don't always find elsewhere. Our universities and colleges provide a pipeline of talent and our business community works together in a way that's unique.

Nicola Johns

CEO, ITPS.

Did you always envisage a career in the world of Technology?

I started my career as a trainee Accountant working in Practice, qualifying at the age of 22. I enjoyed visiting the many clients I would see regularly, and I have always been commercially minded. I took the leap in 2011, when I left the world of working in Practice, and joined ITPS as Finance Manager.

I progressed to Finance Director and then CFO. I have been fortunate to undertake a broader role as CFO, working closely with our customers and driving the business forward. It's something I'm passionate about, and the role of CEO was a natural next step. I'm excited to lead ITPS through it's next phase of growth.

What tips would you give to someone looking to work in the industry?

Be curious! There is no such thing as a stupid question, keep learning, communicate and listen. Hands on experience is invaluable, apprenticeships and graduate programmes offer a great entry into the world of Tech.

Tell us about the most exciting project your currently working on?

We are excited to be working on a large Private Virtual Data Centre (PVDC) project for a business to consolidate and integrate acquisitions into one platform. A real-world challenge for many businesses is the spiralling cost of public cloud charges; they can be unpredictable and CFO's are uneasy when it comes to forecasting the charges. We solve this problem by re-patriating workloads into our private cloud platform and can offer full geo-resiliency for the most business-critical services.

Tell us about your team?

I've been fortunate enough to inherit a team of great people who are a combination of people I've worked with for a long time, and others who are newer to the business, with more to join over the coming months. For me, working towards a clear goal together and seeing people continuously develop within a great culture is how I'd like all the teams in our business to operate.

What are your long term plans for the business?

We are finalising our business plan for FY26-FY28 as we speak!

Do you have any heroes or mentors?

From a business perspective, I have always admired Hans Snook. He built the "Orange" mobile brand back in 1994 that was hugely ahead of its time. He forged a culture of pride and ensured that every team member became an ambassador, creating 70% brand awareness with a logo that was nothing like the fruit. He was one of the first tech leaders to talk about business outcomes before technical specification and he led in a calm and authentic manner; listening was key for him.

During my career, one person who was a great mentor is someone who I reported to very briefly. This person always had the time to stop and answer a question, even though I knew they were super busy. I would like to think that I have taken some of that kindness and support into my own way of working.

What's your fondest career memory?

My fondest career memory happened just eight weeks ago, when my appointment as CEO was announced to the ITPS team. The reaction was one of overwhelming love and support and I have been blown away by all the messages I have received. There was no feeling like it, being able to lead the company you have loved and believed in for 15 years is really something.

Whats the best piece of business advice you've received?

Always know your audience and listen more than you speak. Take the time to research and keep learning.

When not working how do you like to relax?

An enthusiastic group of 63 children and adults with disabilities recently took part in what was the largest ever Reason To Disability Triathlon in Hexham.

The competitors, aged from 8-years-old to adult, have a wide variety of disabilities and were able to complete a traditional triathlon by swimming, running and cycling with support and specially adapted equipment.

Mobile first and channel ubiquity

Why it's time to rethink how you sell online.

Mobile tech has changed everything particularly how we shop. No longer do we set aside hours to browse online or brave the elements to hit the high street.

We order plugs when queueing for our latte at Costa and do our supermarket shop while half-watching Netflix in bed.

Two years ago, 70 per cent of our shopping was done on mobile. That figure will have almost certainly rocketed since then.

Think fast images, zero lag and smooth transitions.

The modern shopper has a shrinking attention span and wants instant results, and if you can't give them that, then they'll simply scroll to your competitors.

The best systems are engineered for the real world. They are fast, resilient, and ready for patchy connections and short attention spans.

Make buying simple

The checkout page can be a graveyard for your sales.

Just ask yourself this: How many times have you come to pay online, only to be asked to fill in a form longer than your self-assessment?!

Or even worse, create an account with a fiddly password you'll never remember.

As their names suggest - Apple Pay, Google Pay and PayPal - all pay to use. They make checkout easy.

Fewer steps = more sales.

Connect everything

Shoppers may first spot your product on Instagram, add it to the site's wish list, and then eventually buy it on your app.

That's great, but if your systems don't talk to each other, their experience falls apart.

This is where composable commerce comes in.

That sounds fancy, but it's a way of saying your data and platforms should sync up

behind the scenes so that customers can always pick up where they left off.

Make it personal...

...but don't make it creepy.

We already all feel like we are being listened to on our devices, so don't turn this into digital surveillance.

A gentle reminder about what they've left in their basket is not only fine, but sensible as it could easily nudge up your sales.

Think of this as a shop assistant: A good one will ensure you have what you need, but won't pester you around the store.

Keep testing

Your platforms all differ, and what might fly on your app might flop on your website.

Try, test and tinker.

Small, consistent improvements often outperform big overhauls.

Why your website must be secure and up to date in 2026

When a cyber attack halts production at the UK's biggest car manufacturer for weeks, now almost months, it's a huge wakeup call to digital risks. Jaguar Land Rover's ongoing production outage has disrupted factories, retailers and suppliers proving that just one breach can ripple through an entire supply chain and stop real-world operations in their tracks.

Public institutions haven't been spared either. The British Library's ransomware attack started with a single weak control, with hackers breaking through the library's virtual private network that allowed employees to access its network from any location. This spiralled into the possession of stolen data, like employees' passport scans and work contracts and led to months of disruption and costly recovery work. The Library and the UK Information Commissioner's Office (ICO) later published lessons so others could avoid the same mistakes.

For senior leaders across further and higher education, local and mayoral authorities, councils, public bodies and professional services, this is not a new issue. Your website is often your most visible service and when it's left neglected it becomes a convenient backdoor into all your more sensitive digital systems.

Even the celebs aren't safe! Jeremy Clarkson's pub The Farmer's Dog was subject to a cyber attack, with £27,000 being stolen through his accounting systems. The hackers went unnoticed at first as there were no obvious signs on how they got in. This example highlights just how important good cyber security procedures are. No one is safe from a cyber attack, whether you're a public figure or small business owner just starting up.

Security isn't something you set up once and forget about, it can't just be left to run, it needs constant care. That means updates are scheduled, not left to chance. Backups aren't just stored, they're tested rigorously to make sure they actually work. Monitoring and



maintaining your security should become part of your routine, making it an ongoing process.

Marketing and Media Matters

In the latest of this popular series of features we spoke to...

Dave Head

Founder, Northern Design & Digital Marketing.

Did you always envisage a career in the Marketing and Media Industry?

Yes I did. I've been obsessed with colouring in since I was a young lad. I thought I'd be a designer, and for a while I was, but design's always been tied to marketing, so one thing naturally led to the other. Then I discovered the tech side of the business and that got me hooked. Digital Marketing became my thing. All of it. Strategy, content, the lot. One of my old bosses once said, "If you can't dazzle them with diamonds, baffle them with bullshit." That line has stuck with me for years.

How did your career kick off?

Straight out of university I landed a great job as the sole Designer for CitizenM Hotels. That took me to Amsterdam which changed everything. I learned so much over there. I worked on everything from quirky guerilla campaigns to sleek email sequences, and designed anything you can imagine – even shower caps. When I moved back to the UK, I actually struggled more than I expected. The Dutch are brutally honest, and over here, that same directness was perceived as being rude. It took me a little while to find the right balance.

What's been the biggest challenge?

Staying seen. When you're running your own business, wearing all the hats, delivering the work and building your name at the same time, it's a lot. Being visible while keeping up the quality and consistency is a difficult job.

Who are your Heroes and Mentors?

Rory Sutherland's marketing brain is unreal and Riley Brown is doing clever things with AI. But truthfully? My mam and dad. They were a real business driving force together. While my mam ran her design business for 25 years, working with brands like Nissan, Bentley and Jaguar Land Rover, my dad was right there alongside her. Together they built a mini property empire on top of it all. They grafted hard, built something real and showed me what it means to run a business with heart and ambition. Watching them both work as a team made a massive impact on me.

What fictional character can you relate to?

When I was young I was very like Dennis the Menace from the Beano comic. Full of beans and always up to something. These days I've calmed down, but there's still a spark of cheek and a need to push buttons now and then.

What is your greatest strength?

I'm always looking for a smarter way. I can't stand hearing "that's just how we've always done it." No it isn't. There's always a better way. That drive to improve and keep things interesting is what keeps me going.

And your biggest weakness?

Taking on too much. I'm into everything – web, design, photography, email, PPC, you name it. I love it all and I want to be involved in it all. Sometimes that spreads me a little to thinly. However being a jack-of-all-trades has its perks. I can jump into any part of a project and actually make it better. The full saying goes, "Jack of all trades, master of none, but often times better than master of one" – and that sums me up perfectly. I'd rather know enough to get stuck in and make a difference across the board than be boxed into just one thing.

What has been your proudest achievement?

Outside of raising my son, which is hands down number one, I'd say a freelance project where I helped design for genetically modified mosquitoes. It played a part in reducing malaria and it still blows my mind to this day.

Where do you want to go next?

I want to grow NORTHERN into a full service agency, built on good people doing good work for other good people. I still want to get the crayons out daily and I'm certainly not aiming to run a massive corporate beast. I just want to keep helping businesses I believe in, doing creative work that gets real results.

What's the best advice you've ever had?

"If you can't dazzle with diamonds, baffle with bullshit" will always be up there, but "shy bairns get nowt" is the one I live by. Ask the question. Send the message. Make the move. Being polite doesn't mean being passive.

Where do you think your industry is heading?

AI is going to keep shaking things up. And I'm here for it. It's not about replacing people, it's about getting rid of the dull, repetitive tasks we all hate. It gives me more time to be creative and strategic, and that's where the real value is.

How do you unwind?

I climb. It keeps me grounded and gives my brain a break. And I won't lie, there's the odd late-night doomscroll on the sofa. That's marketing life, right?

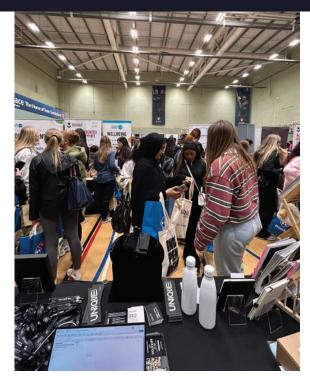

success," adds Kat.

"We have established a great presence across the North-east and it was great to see so many new faces and familiar ones in Redcar."

NetWORK NotWORK is also extremely committed to its younger members and provides a series of programmes, including 'Level Up! Navigating your way to WORK with NetWORK NotWORK', supporting individuals not in employment, education or training (NEET), and 'Ignite XP', supporting children and young adults from eight to 24, as well as a creative media programme, 'Junior Journalism', to give pupils opportunities to explore the world of work, develop vital skills and build their confidence.

"At NWNW we believe that every child and young person deserves the chance to thrive, no matter their background," says Kat.

What investors really want to see in your pitch deck

When you're preparing to raise investment, your pitch deck is often the first chance an investor has to understand who you are and what you're about. But with so much advice out there, many founders end up overcomplicating the story.

The best decks keep things simple. They combine a clear narrative with confident structure and design, making it easy to see scalability, ambition and credibility from the first meeting.

Start with the story, not the slides

Short, active headlines help too. "Our market is expanding fast" tells the reader far more than "Market opportunity."

Show credibility without overloading

Investors are looking for evidence of progress, not walls of text or technical deep dives. Focus on stats that show momentum: early results, partnerships, pilots or product milestones.

Swap buzzwords for results and make your progress easy to grasp in seconds. A single clear chart or timeline often says more than a paragraph of explanation.

Design that reflects confidence

The way your deck looks sets the tone from the start. Make sure it reflects a brand that's professional, ambitious, and investorready.

Good design gives your story credibility. Clean layouts, consistent visuals and thoughtful use of colour all signal attention to detail. When the design feels polished and cohesive, it tells investors you take your business seriously and know how to present it.

Founders often try to say too much. Cramming in every detail or technical explanation often makes it harder to follow.

A clear, focused deck shows you know what matters. It proves you can prioritise information, cut through complexity and guide people to the key takeaways.

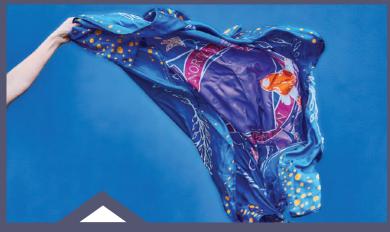

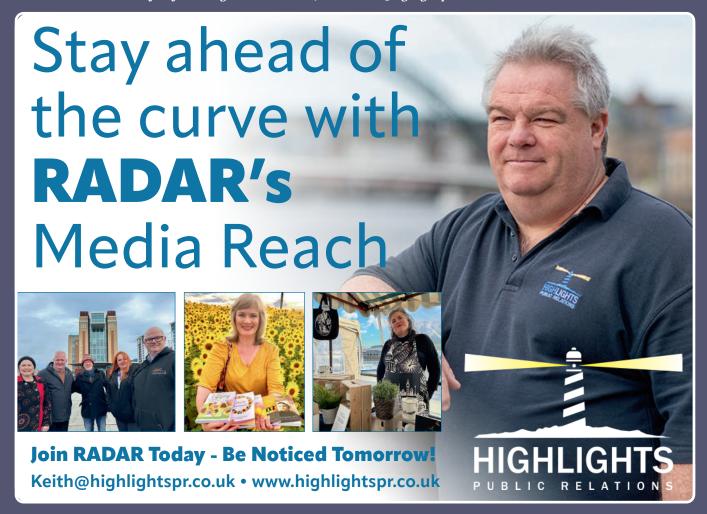

Polar NE moves into prison sector with 'game changing' HMP Stirling project

The Middlesbrough-based company, Polar NE, has completed a "game-changing" project at HMP Stirling. The £85m site is the first new women's prison in Scotland in a generation, and the project is Polar's first within the UK prison estate.

"HMP Stirling is a flagship project and we are proud to have played our part," said James Hill, Managing Director of Polar NE.

"Our innovative products are designed to prevent self-harm and save lives, and their use here shows the difference they can make in an environment where safety must always come first.

"We see this as a major step into a market where we know our industry-leading expertise can really help."

And the need for help has never been greater, with Government statistics revealing that prison deaths are rising.

There were 401 deaths in custody in the 12 months leading up to June 2025 – more than one a day - a 30 per cent year-on-year rise. Tragically, over a fifth of those were self-inflicted. Additionally, self-harm rates in both male and female prisons are at their highest level since records began in 2004, with charities repeatedly warning that too many inmates are at risk of taking their own lives.

To help slow the tide, Polar NE supplied and installed 120 Humber Two Secure windows - the company's most popular window solution - along with additional Trent Secure fixed units at the new state-of-the-art prison.

The windows boost both security and independence for up to 100 women at the 'Scandinavian-style' HMP Stirling. The prison has already won a raft of awards for its trailblazing style, whilst being hailed as a blueprint for modern custodial design.

What is quality in Architecture?

One of the most difficult questions in architecture is how to define quality and how do you measure this quality.

To many people, quality is what the building looks like, or the materials chosen for its construction. At university and beyond, architects will look to judge, debate and review the success of a building design in purely academic design

But I think the answer is more complex than that. Quality of a design is of course about the designer's skills and ability to create a three-dimensional form. It is also about how it functions and works for a client; history has examples of beautiful buildings that fail in the task of performance.

Can a building that is poorly detailed or leaks in wet weather really be defined as high quality? I can think of examples, even recent listed examples in the North East, which have leaked since the day they opened.

In running a busy practice, we work across many sectors involving different scales,

challenges and a huge variety of client briefs. We discuss what a client wants, their budgets and sustainability requirements; but assessing the quality can be overlooked. A larger budget doesn't necessarily guarantee greater quality.

When people choose cars, I think quality is higher on the agenda than in architecture. These days virtually every car can travel at 70mph and is reliable, warm and safe. However, customers choose a BMW over a Skoda because of the perception of quality when in fact both will perform equally well. In such cases, the image, impact and perception of quality is just as important as the real quality.

So, taking the car analogy back to architectural quality - the design is vital in delivering looks, style and appearance, but the quality is equally in the service, guidance and help.

Architecture is often about building a 'one off prototype', unlike a car. So, the quality that comes from your architect is about getting the building to function and flow, ensuring its design is appropriate for its setting and maximising its orientation in terms of views and sunlight. It doesn't matter if it's a house, a surgery or factory there are always key qualities to achieve.

So, in architecture some commissions are about the visual appearance, some about the impact of the development, but a great many are about its functionality and performance in operation.

I have already touched upon the areas of service and help. This is where a good architect is vital in the success of a project. There is no substitute for experience and knowledge, working alongside skill and



talent. Employing the right architect to help you is key - I have written this many times - but it's so true.

Quality in architecture, like a car or a bespoke piece of furniture, is more than design - it's the materials, the thought, its fitness for purpose and longevity.

Quality, in whatever definition it is used in architecture is complex and multi-faceted. So, a quality building can be an industrial shed as much as a civic building. Its value lies in how a client responds to it and uses the building as much as how others simply view that building.

The Renters' Rights Bill: What every landlord needs to know

As the Renters' Rights Bill moves closer to becoming law, landlords across the UK should prepare for some of the most significant changes to the private rented sector in recent years. The Bill, which returned to the House of Lords on 14th October 2025 for further consideration, is expected to receive Royal Assent shortly after.

Once enacted, the Renters' Rights Act will bring several key reforms that will alter the way landlords manage tenancies. Among the most notable changes are:

- The end of fixed-term Assured Shorthold Tenancies (ASTs), replaced by Periodic Assured Tenancies.
- Tenants will be required to give two months' notice before leaving a property.
- New restrictions on Section 8 grounds, with some not applicable during the first 12 months of a new tenancy.
- Landlords must provide two months' notice to increase rent under the revised Section 13(2) rules.
- The introduction of a Private Rented Sector Database and the Landlord Ombudsman, both designed to improve accountability and transparency within

These updates are intended to create a fairer and more consistent rental market, but they will also demand that landlords stay informed and compliant with the new legal requirements.

How will a ban on upward-only rent reviews affect you?

The government's proposal to ban upward-only rent reviews in commercial leases aims to make rents more responsive to market conditions and rebalance the landlord-tenant dynamic.

However, its implications for landlords, tenants, and investors are far-reaching and complex.

How things stand

Upward-only rent reviews, linked to open market rents, have long defined commercial leases across England and Wales. They guarantee that rent will never fall during the lease term, even if market conditions weaken.

For landlords, especially institutional investors such as pension funds and REITs, this provides predictable income, supports valuations, and reassures lenders.

For tenants, however, it can mean paying above-market rents during downturns, reducing flexibility and increasing financial pressure.

The proposal and timings

The English Devolution and Community Empowerment Bill is at committee stage. There's still time for amendments and we're months away from achieving Royal Assent but upward-only rent reviews look set to disappear in England and Wales.

The ban would apply to most commercial leases under the Landlord and Tenant Act 1954, including retail, offices, industrial, hospitality and not-for-profit sectors. It will only impact new leases granted after the legislation comes into force and will not affect existing leases.

What's being banned

The legislation targets any clause preventing rent from falling - whether tied to open market value, turnover, or indexation.

Anti-avoidance provisions will override attempts to sidestep the rules, such as side agreements or rent floors. Compliant clauses must allow rent to move both up and down in line with market evidence or agreed formulas. Stepped uplifts and caps will still be permitted, with further clarification expected through secondary legislation.



Implications for tenants

For occupiers, the change could bring several benefits:

- Flexibility: Rents may now fall during downturns, offering relief when trading conditions weaken.
- Transparency: Leases could become simpler, with fewer one-sided clauses.
- Negotiating power: Tenants could be in a stronger position as a key point of leverage for landlords is removed.

However, landlords will likely adjust by seeking higher starting rents, fewer incentives, or shorter lease terms to offset potential income volatility.

Implications for landlords and investors

Landlords face the greatest challenge: the loss of income certainty. Rental streams could fluctuate, affecting valuations and loan security. Pension funds and long-term investors may view such assets as less attractive without guaranteed rent floors.

Likely market responses include:

- A shift to stepped or index-linked rents (without collar) allowing rents to track inflation.
- Shorter leases, though this risks higher turnover and void costs.
- Higher starting rents and reduced upfront incentives.
- More conservative lending and valuations as banks factor in rental volatility.
- A two-tier market emerging between old "up-only" and new "up/down" leases, complicating valuations.

Practical considerations

The impact will vary by sector. The retail market - already accustomed to turnover rents and shorter leases - may see limited disruption with a reform to business rates far more pressing.

Office and industrial/logistics markets are

likely to see a widening gap between prime and secondary stock, particularly as greater uncertainty around income predictability will increase the threshold at which development becomes viable - likely leading to reduced supply in the medium term (which may drive higher rental growth for new, high quality stock).

A period of uncertainty is likely meaning lease negotiations may stall while parties await clarity, while others may rush to complete deals before the ban takes effect - creating short-term market distortions.

Strategic actions

For landlords and investors:

- Review portfolios for exposure to upwardonly leases and be proactive with tenants.
- Engage early with lenders to discuss potential financing impacts.
- Explore compliant rent models such as stepped, turnover-based, or hybrid structures.

For tenants:

- Review lease expiry and renewal timelines to decide whether to delay negotiations.
- Factor possible rent review changes into budgeting.
- Consider index-linked reviews or shorter cycles to align with business planning.

Conclusion

The commercial property market will adapt to the ban on upward-only rent reviews, as seen in other countries, but the transition will bring short-term disruption.

Businesses should use the coming months to plan strategically - review lease portfolios, seek expert advice, and prepare for negotiations under a new framework that could fundamentally reshape the leasing landscape in England and Wales.

Getting around

I guess that the majority of readers of Northern Insight live in an urban environment – in the city including the suburbs, or one of our larger towns such as Morpeth, Alnwick or Sunderland or maybe at the coastal trio of Tynemouth, Cullercoats and Whitley Bay.

We are actually quite lucky in having a decent road system – the A1 and A19 north to south, and the A69, A184 and A1058 east to west, and several other dual carriageways as well as other fast roads. We can reach London in less than three hours and buses and the Metros are, when they are running, a boon to commuters. We are still waiting for Stadler to get the rest of the new Metro cars into service to improve reliability and quality of service, but at least the convenient route is in place.



Or is it? I am a member of the Metro Facebook page and another member said the Metro was not fit for service because it served an old economy – citing in particular the shipyards. When I was young however, the local "Tyneside Loop" had two major differences to the system we enjoy today. Firstly, the main junction of the service is now Monument, right in Newcastle City Centre, not half a mile south at Central Station, and this has brought



the service to the businesses of Newcastle as well as Sunderland. Soon hopefully (soon being a relative word) it will connect Washington to our City Centres. But in the meantime the second part of the loop, the Riverside line, was closed 54 years ago. This really was a line for the Tyneside shipyards - although it would have also been useful for me as then there was a station within easy walking distance of St Peter's Basin. Like the chicken and egg - should transport go to home and work centres or do home and work centres go to transport? If we analyse the situation in my lifetime, I would say, the demand built the transport but before then did transport build the demand? In London John Betjeman coined the phrase "Metro Land" - do not we have our own Metro Land (albeit based on the Metro system) it isn't too many generations ago that Gosforth, Benton, Monkseaton, Boldon and Pelaw were rural or semi-rural

settlements, often based around mine workings, but their growth came with the introduction of the railways, which of course is a Geordie invention, thanks to George Stephenson.

I believe we should capitalise on our public transport system. Catch a Metro from Sunderland to Newcastle and you won't be far from the sea to open countryside to each City Centre, catch one from Newcastle to the Coast via Four Lane Ends then before you see the sea you will pass, at least speed, past corn and rape fields. Many people do drive into the City Centre and other hubs, but not all the cars do any more than move a parking bay from outside at home to outside of work. We need people in all town centres to keep them alive, but if we can just get our public transport better, we will do this so much more successfully.

Could you become a teacher?

Teach First BCCET SCITT applications are now open.



When 22-year-old Bobbi Bowman decided she wanted to train as a teacher, she knew exactly which school she wanted to learn her vocation – the very primary school she herself attended as a child.

"I wanted to become a teacher because I wanted to inspire other people the same way I was when I was at school," explains Bobbi, a graduate from Durham University with a degree in business management.

Bobbi stayed in touch with the teachers at St Godric's Catholic Primary School in Wheatley Hill and volunteered a day a week before starting the Teach First SCITT programme with Bishop Chadwick Catholic Education Trust in September.

"I have always loved working with children; I just love being around children," she says.

"Because I was already volunteering with a BCCET school, it felt natural to do my teacher training with the Trust. I'm feeling very nervous and excited. My first impressions of the programme have been brilliant; it is so well organised. Even though I knew the teachers at the school, I didn't know many other people at the Trust, but everybody has been lovely."



Bobbi is in good company as 100% of last year's trainees secured teaching roles at the end of their training. BCCET has 25 primary schools and five secondary schools across East Durham, South Tyneside and Sunderland. Trainee teachers receive one-to-one support from experienced mentors, hands-on experience and high-quality training.

The course is not only designed for recent graduates like Bobbi. Alex Dyssell, 33, previously worked as an English teacher in South Korea for several years before starting the Teach First BCCET programme in September at St Matthew's Catholic Primary School in Jarrow.

Chloe Harvey, 26, has a Master's in music and is a trainee secondary school teacher at St Anthony's Girls' Catholic Academy in Sunderland.

She has wanted to become a teacher since she first picked up a musical instrument 19 years ago when she was in Year 3 and met an inspirational violin teacher who first introduced her to music.

"From that point, there was a fire lit in me, and I absolutely loved it and the more that I engaged in music, the more I wanted to pursue this and give other people that feeling," she says.

"When I did my research on teacher training programmes, I looked at different educational trusts and I loved BCCET's values and the aspirations that the Trust has for its students regardless of their background or ability."

Applications are now open for September 2026. Courses are available in Primary 4-11, Primary 3-7 and Secondary in Maths, English, Biology, Chemistry, Physics, History, Geography, RE, Music, PE and MFL.

To be eligible to apply, you will need: an undergraduate degree or equivalent, to demonstrate significant knowledge in the subject you are applying to teach (either through your degree qualification, A Levels or relevant experience), and Grade 4 (C) or above in English and maths GCSEs or equivalent qualification.

To teach primary, you will also need Grade 4 (C) or above in science GCSE.

The building blocks of future leaders

As the Head of a Junior School, educating boys and girls from ages 3 - 11, my days are often filled with the sounds of laughter in the playground, phonics lessons, and of exuberant amateur brass players during a music lesson.

However, underneath this cheerful cacophony are many deliberate threads, which all come together to help shape our young people into the leaders of tomorrow.

Emotional Awareness and Empathy

As well as working their way through the curriculum, focusing on their literacy, numeracy, languages, and much more, from their first moments in school I see firsthand how teaching can begin to embed important values in our young people. One of the big things we work on at Dame Allan's is ensuring every child feels happy and confident through our specialist pastoral care offering. With access to a dedicated wellbeing area - The Cosy Snug - plus counsellors, wellbeing assemblies, staff trained as mental health first aiders, and accessible mental health quiz software, Zumos, pupils grasp from a young age that understanding their emotions and the emotions of others is a key part of life. Not only does this build self-awareness, but crucially it embeds a strong sense of empathy - vital for any well-rounded young person making their way in an increasingly divided world.







Yes, you can be a Mentor

Leadership and mentoring skills are directly taught at Dame Allan's at an early age. There are lots of opportunities to get involved, such as our Digital Leaders Programme, which empowers pupils to develop their own tech skills and volunteer as peer mentors to teach younger pupils how to be more digitally savvy.

Our Buddy Scheme too is another way that our pupils can take on some additional responsibility. Year 5 pupils 'buddy' up with Reception pupils to show them the ropes in the outdoor play space, to enjoy sessions playing and reading together, and even take trips out of school. Seeing pupils learn to take the lead and support their younger buddy is so rewarding, and offers them a fantastic chance to act as a role model and trusted friend.

Try, try, try again

When looking at inspiring and nurturing the next generation, we must also consider the importance of helping pupils discover their passions, develop resilience, and enhance their social skills. All of this and more are developed via our thriving co-curricular programme, where Junior School pupils can choose from more than fifty activities each week - from football and dance, to Nature Club, Art Club, choir, and more. These clubs instil a need for timekeeping and organisation, offer the chance to mix with pupils they may not meet in their lessons, and help our young people to develop the resilience to keep trying if they find that they can't score that winning penalty on the first try!

Additionally, our co-curricular programme helps to instil a sense of community in our pupils, something that is increasingly valuable in a world that can be quite insular. For example, our pupils in the choir sing at hospitals and local care homes, whilst our GECO club carries out litter picks and plants gardens onsite for our whole community to enjoy.

When we think about what makes a successful leader, I'd argue that these traits of empathy, confidence, resilience, and community-mindedness will hold any leader in good stead. And, if we can encourage those values in Junior School - alongside the usual fun of playground fresh air, budding friendships, and school lunch smiles - we can be sure that the next generation will be in good hands.

We started the Project A course to give



young people living in the North East of England the opportunity to train as actors. To offer high-quality tuition at an affordable cost. The graduates of the course have gone on to do so much more than we ever could have hoped.

Ten years ago, actor training was increasingly beyond the reach of many young people, regardless of talent or ambition. They have performed professionally in every theatre in the North East. On stages across the country (including London's West End), as well as in Europe, America and New Zealand. They have appeared in films and television series that have won Oscars, Baftas and Golden Globes. They have become commissioned writers, choreographers, facilitators, and some of them, parents. In being who they are, they have waved the North East flag high and championed the region in the best way possible. demonstrating the enormous talent that comes from here across multiple artistic genres.

I am smiling now as I sit here remembering all the many successes.

Project A is constantly evolving, the course responding to changing times in our industry and our world. We have overcome many bumps in the road, facing each challenge with trademark Theatre Royal creativity and can-do attitude. The pandemic saw us deliver two years training online when necessary, nurturing the ensemble in isolation when we worked in our bubble in person and producing a major production on film with the young actors spread all over the North of England, to name but one example.

The training road map for actors is developing as well, focusing on a more accelerated format. We are currently adapting to allow our students more professional performance opportunities whilst training with us. You will always learn faster with the motivation of a first night to aim for!

The future here in the North East is looking bright for the creative industries, with the commitment of our new combined authority to support its development and the creation of a world class workforce. My hopes for the future are that Project A will be an intrinsic part of nurturing the next generation of writers, creators, performers and cultural ambassadors, to help lead the way in this industry for decades to come.

Well done to all the Project A alumni for everything you have achieved! We are proud to celebrate you. It is always a great pleasure to see you perform in the shows I go to, and the TV and films I watch, with the odd Christmas advert thrown in to boot.

Calm before the storm

As autumn brings a chill to the air, we headed off to Dumfries and Galloway with the e-bikes for a few days holiday before all hell breaks loose as Christmas approaches.

Characterized by an unusually large crop of tree seeds such as nuts and acorns, 2025 is indeed a mast year. We didn't need to be reminded of this as we cycled round the south west of Scotland, the sound of acorns falling onto the road, even occasionally our heads, plus the carpet of beech mast and acorns on the roads and paths we cycled over clearly indicated an extraordinarily high volume of nuts.

For once, a trip away which didn't involve a delivery of paintings, prints or anything work-related, made a nice change. This is just as well, since we ended up having to take the Honda Jazz, which came into my possession after my mother's death. Imagine packing two e-bikes, swimming and cycling kit plus clothes etc for five days, also two bags of logs for the log stove (not used as the place was boiling) plus coats, wellies and our own duvets and pillowcases (we're fussy that way) plus a bag of basic food into a little hatchback. Once everything was out of the car we didn't drive again until the day we left for home. The constantly changing scene at the

Solway takes a lot of getting used to.

The sea disappears for hours and hours then races in, where it looks so pretty, and swimming, sailing, fishing etc is all possible, then out it goes again leaving vast areas of shining wet muddy sand for many hours. This raises so many questions, including how people managed to fish from boats. I discovered that Haaf net fishing is a thing in the Solway. Fishermen use huge structures like the things people scoop chips out of the fat in a chippy, but a hundred times bigger. They wade out into the shallow water as the tide comes in and standing chest deep, use these to trap the salmon as they head upriver. Sadly we didn't get a chance to watch the Haaf fishermen.

We cycled, hiked and swam until every part of my body ached and it was time for home. Its always lovely to get home, especially when there are unfinished paintings to get on with, plus ideas for new ones itching to get out. The colours of the landscape and the trees are quite beautiful at this time of year. Bracken which has turned gold, grass which has deepened in colour, heather now dark and white grass all create a tapestry which has inspired the tweed industry which reflects the autumn colours so perfectly.

As we head into the busiest time of the year, with Christmas fairs, open weekends and online orders filling the days, its to stop and observe the small changes in this little part on Northumberland every day and cherish every moment.

Americana and Pre-Columbian culture on Route 66 in Illinois

When it comes to epic road trips, America's Route 66 is arguably the world's most famous.

Roadside attractions, museums and signage have been receiving upgrades ahead of the historic highway's centenary in 2026. That means there's no time like the present to plan a journey on 'the Mother Road'.

That term became popular after John Steinbeck used it in *The Grapes of Wrath*. Telling the story of the Joad family's westward journey along Route 66 during the Great Depression, his novel conveys a sense of the hope it offered.

Billy Troup's much-covered song, written in 1946, encouraged people to "get their kicks" on Route 66. The hit further popularised the appeal of driving the 2,448-mile highway between Chicago and Santa Monica.

Unlike today's multi-lane highways, Route 66 had just one lane in each direction when it opened in 1926. An example of that can be seen at Carpenter Park in Springfield, Illinois. Running through towns and cities, the road helped connect communities and supported livelihoods. It was dubbed 'The Main Street of America'.

Over time, the famous highway's route fluctuated as new sections of road were laid and older alignments bypassed. Cutting journey times for long-distance journeys, multi-lane interstates grew in popularity and Route 66 was decommissioned as a highway in 1985.

Nonetheless, the iconic status of the historic route means that the idea of driving on Route 66 remains aspirational for many travellers. Three weeks is typically the recommended duration for a driving holiday along the entire route. Yet

as someone who enjoys pausing frequently to take photographs, I'd prefer far longer, so decided to experience only the 301 miles within Illinois over a week.

Less really can mean more while travelling. A well-planned itinerary – with numerous highlights along the way – allowed plenty of time to chomp on regional delicacies, including a battered cozy dog, a tenderloin sandwich at the Ariston Café in Litchfield and an ice cream cookie sandwich from Uptown Scoops in Collinsville.

With my flight home booked from Chicago, it made sense to hop southwest to St Louis and then drive back towards my departure point – but at nothing near the speeds of well over 300 miles per hour that the drag racers record at the World Wide Technology Raceway in Madison.

Not all of the highlights along the way were automotive-related or opportunities to embrace 20th-century Americana. Remarkably, the city that occupied what is today Cahokia Mounds State Historic Site, in Collinsville, was more populous than London during its heyday – around the year 1100. It is the site of the biggest pre-Columbian earthwork in the Americas. The vast pyramid stands more than 30 metres high and is known as Monks Mound.

West End Service Station in Edwardsville dates from the 1920s and is one of the few remaining stations from that era where drivers refuelled and had opportunities to consult with mechanics. With restored, gleaming red Texaco pumps and period signage, the station hosts a compact museum that tells the story of the historic highway's significance for the local community.

Fibreglass figures standing 20-ft tall were designed to attract motorists' attention, typically indicating the services of businesses through items they held. Known as 'Muffler Men', various examples can be seen along Route 66, including outside of the Pink Elephant Mall in Livingston, whose mid-century ice cream parlour leads into a store packed with pre-loved Americana.

My final stop before Chicago was Old Joliet Prison – out of choice, not necessity – for a guided tour of the correctional facility that featured in the opening scenes of *The Blues Brothers* film.

Easy to follow and enjoy, Route 66 is a well-travelled way that offers insights into the Americas of both yesterday and today.

Grape Expectations

As regular readers will know, I am partial to a glass or two of vino. I was therefore thrilled to read of the opening of Veeno Durham on the City's Riverwalks.

The wine bar and kitchen captures the magic of Italy's aperitivo culture, offering authentic Italian wines paired with cafésized plates and sharing platters.

Veeno champions wines from small-scale, independent producers while Spuntini boards are also imported from specialist Italian artisan suppliers.

Having visited Sicily this Summer, my wife Lisa and I were immediately transported to happier (and sunnier times).

Lisa, who has developed a palate sharper than mine and a healthy scepticism of anything described as "authentic" had reservations. But, I'm pleased to report, Veeno passed the test.

On a crisp Sunday afternoon, we ventured in, lured by the promise of wine, warmth and a menu that promises a taste of la dolce vita.

What followed was a meal that felt less like dining out and more like being welcomed into someone's home—albeit one with impeccable taste and access to a top vineyard in Marsala.

Fittingly, the atmosphere was relaxed and inviting. Exposed brick, rustic wood, soft lighting, and a wine wall that could double as a passport to Sicily.

From the moment we arrived, we were looked after with genuine warmth—none more so than by our waiter Kieran, who struck the perfect balance between attentive and relaxed.

Friendly without being fussy, he guided us through the menu with the kind of quiet confidence that makes you trust every recommendation and we were certainly made to feel welcome during the final drops of my ever-extending 'birthday month'

Sounds of chatter and glass-clinking pervade the air while some hearty Italian aromas really got the digestive juices flowing.

Under starter's orders, we began with the Grande Sharing Platter, a winning spread of cured meats, cheeses, olives and bruschetta.

It arrived like a Mediterranean care package—truffle salami, speck, Parmigiano, gorgonzola, and a balsamic glaze that really tied the flavours together.

Lisa declared the bruschetta the "best we've had since Summer."

Following on, I opted for the Paccheri all'Arabiata—a bold, fiery tomato sauce clinging to chunky, al dente pasta. It packed just the right amount of heat to make me reach for my wine, incidentally, an excellent bottle of Grillo much like the ones we enjoyed on our travels.

Lisa chose the Tagliatelle ai Funghi, a silky swirl of pasta with earthy mushrooms and a whisper of garlic. She was quiet for a moment, which is always a good sign.









After a meal this good, dessert was always going to be on the cards. Lisa enjoyed the Cannoli Siciliani; crisp pastry shells filled with traditional sweet ricotta. The Tiramisu was textbook—light, boozy, and layered like a good novel.

In a city where dining options are increasingly polished, Veeno offers something relaxed and personal while its wine list will impress even the most seasoned oenophile.

It's a hot ticket to Sicily – minus the passport.

At Lumley Castle, and across the sector, we are committed to doing our part by improving efficiency, investing in our teams, and continuing to deliver exceptional guest experiences. But long-term resilience requires a fair partnership between business and government.

Hospitality is not only about service and tourism – it's about sustaining jobs, driving growth and anchoring local communities. With the right decisions in the upcoming Budget, we can secure a stronger future for our sector and the places we serve.

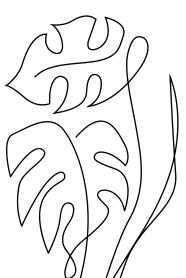

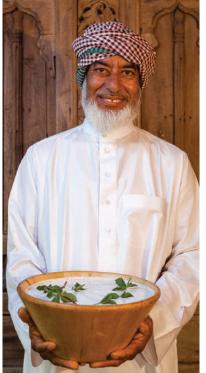

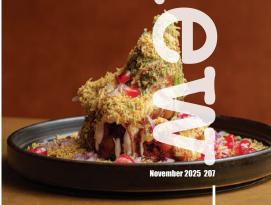














The business of culture

Why corporate partnerships matter to Durham's future.

As Durham prepares to glow once again under the lights of Lumiere 2025, Stuart Lloyd, General Manager at Radisson Blu Durham reflects on how a decade-long partnership with Artichoke helped illuminate not just the city's November nights, but its visitor economy, community connections and corporate identity.

"It's a great example of how cultural events bring public, private and creative sectors together." adds Lloyd.

Investing in infrastructure for the future

As part of a £5 million refurbishment, Radisson Blu Durham's conference and event facilities have been redesigned to meet growing demand from both cultural and corporate clients.

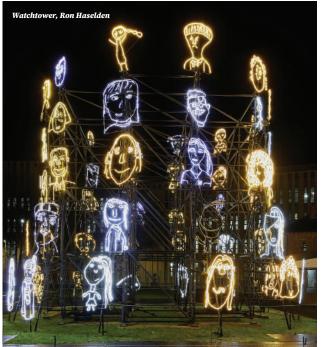
The Auger Suite, which hosts the Lumiere Sponsor's Supper, now offers advanced AV technology, including InstaShare connectivity and reconfigurable layouts that make it ideal for hybrid events, workshops and creative showcases.

"Our refurbished spaces are about flexibility," Lloyd explains. "They can transform from boardroom to gala dinner, from business summit to arts reception. This perfectly reflects Durham's evolving identity as a city where culture and commerce work together."

Beyond the event: year-round impact

While Lumiere will light up three nights this November, the partnership's benefits have and will endure year-round. The event has contributed to stronger local recognition, new client relationships and repeat business from visitors who first discovered the city during the festival.









Durham's hospitality sector has benefited from the increased national profile that Lumiere has brought. Data from Durham County Council shows sustained visitor growth and a broader range of business tourism since the festival began.

Speaking about the partnership Artichoke's Development Director Ma'ayan Plane said: "Radisson Blu stands out because they truly feel like part of the Lumiere family. Their team understands the festival's scale and spirit, and they go above and beyond to make every guest, artist, and visitor feel welcome. They bring energy, professionalism, and a genuine commitment to everyone staying at the hotel during Lumiere. 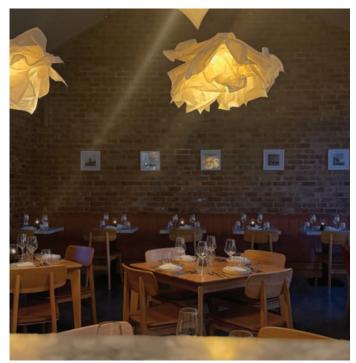

Ember: Sunderland's culinary firestarter

When Ember opened its doors at Sheepfolds Stables a year ago, few could have predicted just how much heat it would bring to Sunderland's culinary scene.

In a city better known for its football chants and shipbuilding heritage than boundary-pushing gastronomy, Ember has quietly – and then not so quietly – flipped the script.

Ember opened its doors with quiet confidence and bold ambition. Tucked inside one of the city's most exciting regeneration projects, it promised to do something different: not just serve exceptional food, but tell stories through flavour.

2025 was their 'Tour of the World' - a culinary odyssey that challenged their chefs to recreate dishes exactly as they'd be found in their home countries. The results were daring, delicious, and often unexpected. Some menus surprised. All impressed. Along the way, Ember earned a coveted place in the Good Food Guide, cementing its reputation as one of the North East's most compelling dining destinations.

When speaking with the team at Ember,

they said: "We have just celebrated a huge milestone at Ember: one year at Sheepfolds. What a ride it's been!

2025 was our Tour of the World, with menus that pushed our chefs to recreate dishes as you would find them in their home countries. Some were wild, all were unforgettable. We also got into the Good Food Guide which is an incredible achievement and we are incredibly proud. December will be our grand finale - a showcase of this year's favourites, plus a Christmas dinner that's already making us hungry.

As for 2026 we are keeping it under wraps for now, but it will be something you won't expect to find in Sunderland and very much Ember, pushing boundaries as far as we can."

For me, Ember is more than a restaurant. It's a statement of intent and a sign that the North East's culinary evolution isn't limited to the bigger cities. It represents a new cultural rhythm for Sunderland one that values creativity, ambition and world-class experiences without losing its sense of place. Its home, Sheepfolds, has become a canvas for reinvention: industrial heritage repurposed into a hub for culture, dining, and nightlife. In that setting, Ember shines as a kind of culinary theatre immersive, surprising, and deeply rooted in storytelling.

This December, Ember will stage its grand finale, but the real intrigue lies in what comes next. 2026 remains under wraps, but the team hints at something wholly unexpected - another bold chapter in this city's unfolding story.

Sunderland may not have been on every foodie's map before - but Ember is making sure it will be.

Places to go...Dunoon







Unusually for this column, I am writing a "Part Two" to tell the rest of my three night stay in Dunoon, but also to reflect on the "nearly zero carbon" nature of my journeys in this long-running series which in some magazines goes back to 2003.

Each time I travel, I usually go by train and occasionally by bus, these being vehicles which will make the journey anyway, whether I am travelling on them or not. Accordingly, if I am riding on a train the extra fuel cost (in electricity or diesel) to move my 100kg is tiny, whereas if I take a car real carbon is emitted to move not only my weight, plus any passengers, and the weight of the vehicle itself. In terms of real carbon emissions, going by bus or train is hugely more beneficial.

I had spent Saturday out in Inverary and the Mull of Kintyre and returning on the last ferry from Tarbert to Portavadie. The hourly ferry was a good deal more frequent than the bus, but the bus – even at 1900 Saturday – was well used with local people making the journey between villages. On the Sunday morning I took a taxi (my mode of last resort) to the outskirts of town to join the congregation of the Episcopal (Anglican) church, where the minister is Rev David Rushton, formerly of St Chad's College, Durham. Unfortunately he was out of town. After a rousing family service, I was given a lift into the town by two members of the congregation, and ended up at the Argyll Hotel where I was staying.

Options were rather limited for Sunday afternoon. First choice, even though rain was forecast, was Benmore, a branch of the Royal Botanic Garden Edinburgh. I had passed it the previous day on the way up to Inverary and was looking forward to seeing their Giant Redwoods and special gardens featuring plants from Chile and Bhutan. Their leaflet referred to a shuttle bus from Dunoon to the gardens, seven miles north. I phoned several times for details, but no answer, and I wondered why they could not just give fuller details in the leaflet or on the website.

Despite its pleasures, a wet Sunday afternoon stuck in Dunoon itself did not appeal. I decided to repeat my experience of using a mobile bus ticket, for the £7.40 Dunoon/Cowal 24 Hour Area. There's only one bus, route 489, out of the depot on a Sunday, which runs between Ardentinny and Toward (yes, towards Toward!) which is a single shift for one driver. It serves all the coastal communities on the Cowal peninsula, and offered the chance to visit Blairmore and Inellan with fine coastal views. There was also the opportunity to look inland to see the fine Victorian and Edwardian houses built

for families who did well out of the industrialisation of the River Clyde.

Whilst I would not particularly recommend an afternoon shuttling between the villages, I had a very good afternoon tea at Blairmore and a walk on the pier and the beach, and a pootle around the village of Inellan with a textbook style public toilet and waiting facility, pictured. The 24 Hour area ticket was, of course, still valid on the following morning. Caledonian MacBrayne don't operate at certain times to allow for crew rest periods, so I was able to use my bus ticket to reach Hunters Quay where the competing Western Ferries service sails to McInroy's Point, Gourock. A short bus ride into Gourock station had me quickly on the train to Glasgow and onward to Carlisle and home.

"Turning 'disabled' to 'enabled' is more than a statement. The consultancy offers expert advice, training, and practical strategies to foster more inclusive workplaces.

"Many companies already have policies and procedures in place, but there's often room for improvement," John says. "Sometimes it's not about expensive structural adaptations—it's about supportive attitudes, flexibility, and open communication."



Tyneside Doctor leads new effort to deliver frontline ambulances to Ukraine

Dr. Anatoliy Telpov, an Emergency Department doctor at South Tyneside District Hospital, has teamed up with local boxing clubs and FSNE Medical Group to send two frontline ambulance vehicles and a 17-seat minibus to Ukraine.

"This project focuses on getting evacuation vehicles directly to frontline brigades and hospitals," said Dr. Telpov. "The aim is to create an efficient chain so that wounded soldiers can be quickly evacuated and reach medical care faster."

The latest delivery includes a fully equipped frontline ambulance destined for a military hospital, a Land Rover 4x4 ambulance going to a frontline brigade and a17-seat minibus provided by Empire School of Boxing in Blyth, which will be used to move personnel and supplies near the front line.

FSNE Medical, led by Craig and Melissa Douglas, have donated the two ambulance vehicles. The company previously supported Dr. Telpov's efforts by funding earlier deliveries and vehicle costs.

"This will be the third and fourth vehicle we've donated," said Craig Douglas, Director of FSN Medical. The ambulance is a full NHS-spec vehicle with all the essential equipment, and the Land Rover 4x4 will help reach patients in hard-to-access areas."

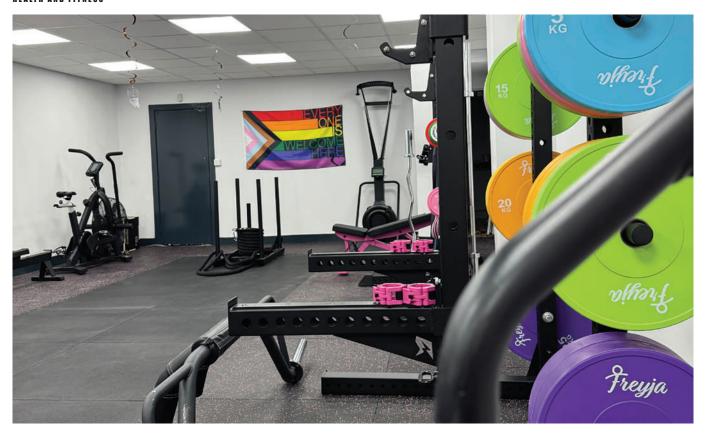

This highlights the urgent need for stronger standards, better education, and accountability across the industry.

Journal, 2025; GOV.UK, 2025). While consultation and legislation are still ongoing, it's clear that regulation is no longer optional, it's essential.

As practitioners, we must balance innovation with responsibility. The rise of regenerative treatments and advanced skin therapies offers exciting opportunities, but clinical evidence and patient safety must remain our foundation. Progress is only meaningful when it's grounded in ethics. Running a clinic in this environment also means leading by example, showing that medical aesthetics can be compassionate, professional, and empowering.

Sadly, the lack of regulation and the ease of access to low-quality training courses have created a space where unqualified individuals can legally perform medical

This not only confuses patients but also challenges ethical practitioners to uphold higher standards in an increasingly unregulated environment.

At Self Medical Aesthetics, we choose the opposite: to educate, to protect, and to raise the bar. We refer when needed, we prioritise safety over sales, and we hold our integrity, even when it means saying "no."

Finding calm in a world that won't slow down

Hello! I'm Craig, founder of Clear Mind Meditation, and I'm delighted to be writing a monthly column for Northern Insight. Each month, I'll share practical tools and insights from the world of meditation and wellness - designed to help you live with more clarity, calm, and resilience.

Let's begin with a question: why is it so hard to feel calm?

The answer lies in our nervous system. Most of us are stuck in "fight or flight" - the body's ancient stress response. To understand why, let's rewind 50,000 years to our hunter-gatherer ancestors. Life was simple, but dangerous. Imagine you are faced with a sabre-toothed tiger, the body would respond instantly: heart racing, muscles tensing, adrenaline and cortisol flooding the system. Once the threat passed, the body would return to baseline.

Back then, this stress response activated maybe 1–5 times per week. Today? It's triggered 20–50 times per day. Not by predators, but by deadlines, traffic, financial pressure, and the constant hum of digital noise. Our bodies react as if we're under threat - but we rarely get to "fight" or "flee." Instead, we stay stuck in tension, dysregulating our nervous system and affecting sleep, focus, and overall wellbeing.

So how do we shift out of this state?

Meditation is one of the most effective tools we have. Start with just 10 minutes a day, ideally in the morning. Sit quietly, close your eyes, and rest your awareness on the breath. When thoughts arise - as they will, gently let them dissolve and return to the breath. With patience and consistency, you'll begin to notice your triggers, regulate your responses, and find a sense of inner stillness.



One technique I love is Black and White Breathing. Take a deep breath in and imagine white, warm light filling your body - bringing peace and calm. Hold for a few seconds. As you exhale, picture thick black smoke leaving your body, releasing tension, stress, or anything you're ready to let go of. You can use this on the spot (say, stuck in traffic or before a big meeting) or as part of a deeper meditation practice.

In a world that rarely pauses, these small rituals can really help us reconnect with our true inner essence, of stillness and peace.

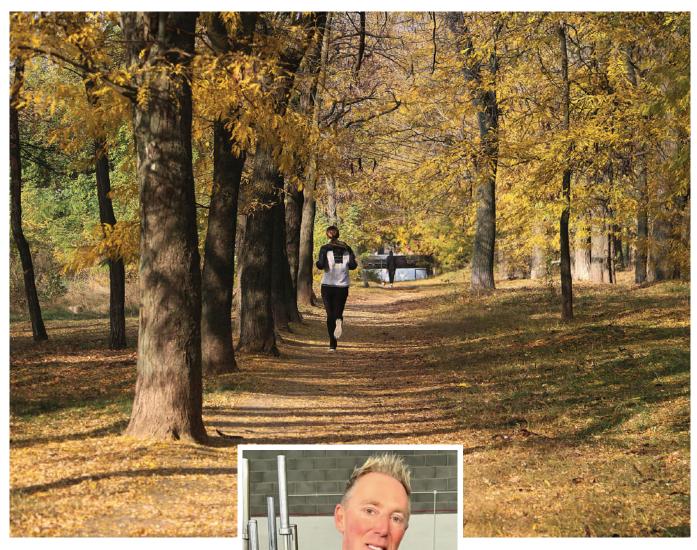

The Seasonal Effect

Just because the nights are drawing in doesn't mean it's time to overindulge and hide beneath bigger, bulkier clothes.

Waiting until next year to make a change won't get you anywhere. If you want to reach and maintain a healthy weight, you need lasting lifestyle changes ongoing, rather than seasonal efforts.

The reality is worrying, obesity rates are at an all-time high, especially here in the North East. One in three children now leaves primary school overweight, a shocking statistic that reflects how unhealthy habits have been passed down through generations. Things won't improve until we take personal responsibility for ourselves and for our children. - Eat fruit instead of drinking it. Smoothies can pack in far more calories than you'd normally eat whole.

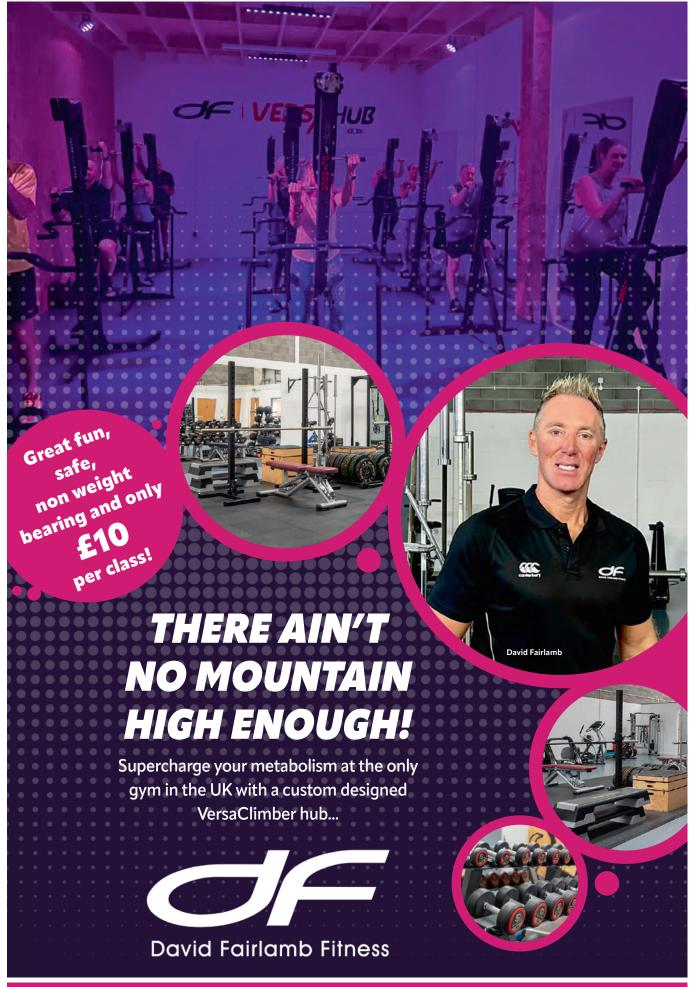
- Be honest about those small treats with tea or coffee, cut them back or cut them out.
- Make your own lunch. Shop bought so called healthy options are often high in fat or sugar. Preparing your own ensures you know what's going into your body.
- Drink more water, especially before meals, to help prevent overeating.
- Use a smaller plate, your brain will think you've had a bigger meal than you actually have.
- Watch your sugar intake. 4g equals 1 teaspoon. Adults should aim for no more than 28g per day. Check labels and cut back where you can.

Too much attention can be paid to opinion polls when there may be four years until the next general election. However, recent polls make alarming reading for both of the (currently) major parties, suggesting stated voting intentions indicate that Reform could win over 400 seats.

Reform is said to attract centre and right of centre voters from Labour and Conservatives. Hence the Labour conference aimed at decrying Reform and its leader.

Now it is suggested the bigger threat to Labour is from the Green Party, attracting left-wing voters, disillusioned by Labour's claimed shift to the right on welfare, migration and transgender rights, and the Greens' extreme views on Gaza. They now have 126,000 members, which is more than the Tories. Some of their policies attracting Labour voters include nationalising gas and electric companies, a strident wealth tax and banning domestic flights between British airports if travelling by train takes less than three hours.

It won't be long before the new extreme leftie Jeremy Corbyn party, as yet with neither a name nor an identity, jumps into bed with the Greens.

Against this background, the Chancellor will be struggling to devise an impending budget which is acceptable to her party and avoiding further serious damage to public finances, the cost of living and the prospect of growth. There is a massive hole in the national finances (the blame for which can no longer be placed on the previous government). How will the budget on November 26 deal with this?

The National Institute of Economic and Social Research postures that the shortfall is now £50 billion. This is deeply uncomfortable in the context of Rachel Reeves' previous budget, which unleashed on the UK no less than £40billion in tax rises, largely but not solely focussed on businesses and high earners. The raising of national insurance on employers, abolition of non-dom status, increase in capital gains tax and increased stamp duty on second homes have all had serious and in some cases unintended consequences. Rather than 'fixing' the economy, they have seriously damaged it.

Increased taxation has shaken business confidence, discouraged recruitment and increased the thousands fleeing the country to avoid a punitive tax regime.

How will the Chancellor demonstrate a pro-growth agenda? From where will she produce the extra revenue?

It is predicted that the target is the 'better off' (who don't see themselves as better off or having the so-called 'broad shoulders'). Ideas include capital gains tax on sales of higher value main residences, cutting the cash ISA allowance and the tax-free pension lump sum.

Such measures will cause pain to the assetrich but cash poor, discourage pension saving, paralyse the housing market and increase rents. More unintended consequences?

A night of joy for Newcastle United defeating Benfica 3-0 in the Champions League. What a great atmosphere, and a nostalgic tribute by Worflags to hero and former manager Joe Harvey.

The banning of Maccabi Tel Aviv football fans from attending their team's match with Aston Villa, sparked understandable outrage as an act of antisemitism.

Birmingham MP Ayoub Khan and Jeremy Corbyn had petitioned for the ban, falsely alleging that the fans are 'violent' and 'hooligans'. The petition showed the real purpose was a political attack on Israel in relation to Gaza - but no reference made to or condemnation of Hamas.

The investigation of violence at a 2024 match in Amsterdam between Ajax and Maccabi Tel Aviv, found there had been a planned premeditated attack by several hundred Arabs and Muslims which they called a "Jew-Hunt". The Khan-Corbyn petition misrepresented the truth of what happened.

Although the PM and other political leaders have called out the Birmingham ban as wrong and said they were working to reverse it, the clear picture was that the police in Birmingham claimed they were unable to keep the away supporters safe from violent attack by people in Birmingham.

To their credit Maccabi Tel Aviv then announced that they would not take an allocation of any tickets for the match in order to protect their fans but expressed the hope that in the future, it would be possible safely to engage in sporting events in Birmingham without the risk of violent attacks.

The message is that Britain's second largest city is not safe for Israeli Jews. The murderous attack against Jews on 2nd October at a synagogue in Manchester makes that message wider and even more troubling.

A more reassuring recent picture was of Countdown's mathematician extraordinaire, Rachel Riley being granted the freedom of the City of London. The citation declared that this was 'in recognition of her antisemitism campaigning and her Holocaust education work'.
